Out of Hours Club

We have an Out of Hours Club, which runs before and after school for all our pupils. It starts each school day at 8.00am, and runs until school starts. The after school sessions run three days a week, until 5.30pm.

Uniform

So much to offer

As a primary school teacher Natasha knew what she was looking for in the perfect school for her children. She'd heard lots of positive comments from colleagues and friends about the academic results, the friendly teachers and the varied extracurricular activities and resources available at Milking Bank Primary School. They moved into the area in the hope of securing a place at the school. "You know a school is good when there's a long waiting list and you struggle to get in," says Natasha. "We knew from other families whose children had been to the school how happy they had been and that too was an important factor for us."

A rounded, holistic approach

"At Milking Bank they focus on what the individual child is good at, which isn't always academic things. Mya's a fairly guiet girl but they turned that into a positive, which set her in good stead for her secondary education," explains Natasha. "The school is brilliant at making the children feel like they really belong. Our heritage is Pakistani and it was important our children felt included and had positive role models. It's a family orientated school and I feel their rounded approach, both academic and personal, provides a strong foundation for the transition to secondary school."

Going beyond the curriculum

"Milking Bank Primary School is very good at doing what's needed to satisfy the curriculum, but they go beyond that by including children's

personal interests to support their learning and by adopting a fun approach which really gets children enthused about their learning and engrossed in their lessons," Natasha adds.

Drawing on individual experiences

Enjoyment at school has ensured Natasha's girls feel happy and comfortable sharing their own experiences of special Muslim celebrations. "The teachers are always interested and they value the girls' contributions and the individuality of what they are bringing to the school, but then it's all inclusive too. They get the balance just right."

A strong community feel

Natasha feels strongly that education is also about teaching children that they are part of a community: "My children are achieving very well academically, but I also want a school to be setting a good example, teaching children that actions have consequences, and working together with parents to reinforce these values. This school does these things very well - their focus on citizenship is a real strength. They believe Every Child Matters."



In high demand

When Kamaljit and Manjit first moved to Dudley, places at Milking Bank Primary School were in high demand. With Avneet being diabetic and insulin dependent it was important to them that she secured a place at a caring school close to home. They were absolutely thrilled when two places became available for Avneet and her cousin, Amanjeet: "We'd heard such positive things about Milking Bank Primary School, we knew we really wanted our children to go there," says Kamaljit.

First class care

It was important to the family that the school understood Avneet's needs but that they didn't treat her differently to the other children. "Every school we'd been in previously requested that we go in and administer Avneet's insulin. Milking Bank Primary School didn't ask us to do that; instead some of the teaching assistants were trained so that they could administer it.

"The staff were absolutely fantastic! Avneet said she felt school was like her second home, they looked after her so well," says Kamaljit. "I really can't fault the care they showed her during her time there."

Understanding of individual needs

When it came to applying for Ranveer's school place the local authority declined Milking Bank Primary School because Avneet had already moved up to secondary school. "We appealed because my sister's child was still there; as we all live together my children consider their cousins as their siblings," explains Kamaljit. "Harninder is in full time education so I'm often the primary carer for her children too; for me to be in two different schools at the same time was impossible!"

Kamaljit adds: "Ranveer was born prematurely and has a reserved character where it takes him time to feel comfortable in new surroundings. We felt it was important for him to be in a settling environment and it was the ideal school due to past experience with Avneet and because Pavan was there."

Inclusive of all cultures

As predicted, Ranveer has settled well into school life and is enjoying his time there. As practising Sikhs, another important factor in securing a place for him was the need for him to feel comfortable in his headscarf. "It was important he felt welcomed and we knew the ethos of the school would mean the children would do that," says Kamaljit

A nurturing environment offering a bright future

When Amanjeet went to Belgium for the Year 6 school trip, Harninder was impressed with the teacher's interest in ensuring she could support him with his headscarf and was happy to show her how to do it. "As a parent it's very reassuring to know your child is there utmost priority. It also shows their respect for the different cultures and religions. Every experience is always a positive one, ensuring nothing holds the children back, which is wonderful!" says Kamaljit.

She adds: "Milking Bank Primary School is like an extension of our family. It offers a safe and nurturing environment where children thrive and are taught to respect one another, regardless of race, disability and gender. We believe the children that go here are offered a brighter future."

A nurturing environment

The size of Milking Bank Primary School really appealed to Natalie and Mark. "We were looking for a school that wasn't too big and somewhere that had a lovely community feel. Of course, we'd also heard great things about the school from other people. It felt like the right environment for Jack so we were very relieved to be offered a place," says Natalie.

Everything seemed to suddenly click for Jack in Year 1. As a summer baby he joined the school as one of the youngest and Natalie found it took him a little while to build his confidence. "He was doing fine in Reception but when Year 1 came along, he just took off," says Natalie. "We think the nurturing environment at Milking Bank Primary School has been something that has really helped him to settle in to school life."

A good balance

Natalie and Mark are really pleased with how much Jack's confidence has grown during his time at Milking Bank Primary School. He initially found it easier to learn his phonics by sight rather than by sound. Natalie liked how the school supported Jack's learning style while continuing to encourage him to work with phonic sounds. "They were happy to go with whatever was working for Jack, rather than pushing something that didn't feel right for him. The teaching staff supported him to take things at his pace, and worked with him to improve his concentration levels and his focus on learning," explains Natalie. "The staff are incredibly caring. We think they have a great balance between nurturing and focused learning. Jack's very happy there and loves learning!"

Exceeding expectations

A lot of the staff are very experienced at Milking Bank Primary School and have been at the school for a number of years, which Natalie believes is a real strength of the school: "You can tell the teachers enjoy their job by their enthusiasm for the children, by how much enjoyment they get from watching the children grow and learn and from the way they know so much about them. It's an indication of a good school for me when the staff choose to stay for so long. Whilst we had heard very good things about Milking Bank Primary School, I think it has exceeded our expectations.

"We feel confident that there is always plenty of support available at Milking Bank Primary School. Jack thoroughly enjoys his lessons and the way different topics are taught. He comes home enthused by them, which is wonderful to see. Admission to our nursery is open to everyone within Dudley, but is limited by the number of spaces available. However children who live within the vicinity, or do not have access to another nursery, are given priority. We also give priority to children with social, health or development needs.
