Mala and Sanjay live in Solihull with their three children - Niharika aged 20, Anshika aged 14 and Aditya aged 11.

Moving schools can be tough for children, and Mala and Sanjay were worried that son Aditya would miss his friends when they moved from Leeds to Solihull when he was in Year 4. In reality, it was a very smooth transition to Peterbrook Primary School.

SETTLING IN

"He settled in really quickly. I thought he might miss his old school, and he still talks to his old friends, but within a week he had new friends at Peterbrook! He was already coming out of school, talking to his new friends outside the classroom," says Mala.

The teachers did a great job of quickly integrating Aditya into the classroom and school life. He is a sociable boy, so he quickly built a great circle of friends, but he also really liked his class teachers and the environment.

"When we applied for a place at Peterbrook, and they accepted it, they invited us to a meet and greet before Aditya started, "says Mala. "My husband and I met with the headteacher, who is a very nice lady, so humble and welcoming. After meeting her, we had a tour and met his class teacher. They gave him a buddy so he could feel comfortable, so he quickly settled and started loving school."

EXCELLENT PROGRESS

Aditya has made very good academic progress at Peterbrook Primary School. "Academically, he is good at maths and English and the teachers are very pleased with him. At parent-teacher meetings, they are always really impressed with his progress in all subjects. We are particularly impressed with how much his writing has improved since starting at Peterbrook," explains Mala.

Aditya sat the 11+ last September, and his excellent results secured a place at the local grammar school, where he will start in September after completing his primary schooling.

OPPORTUNITIES OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM

Aditya has taken full advantage of the extracurricular opportunities at Peterbrook Primary School, too. "He enjoys football and cricket and gets very excited when he comes home to tell us he has scored a goal or got a wicket. He is also learning guitar and really enjoys this. He participates in the Solihull cross country race. There are so many sporting opportunities at the school."



WHAT THE CHILD SAYS:

"I love everything about Peterbrook, especially playing with my friends at break time and lunchtime," says Aditya.

NEW EXPERIENCE

Aditya benefited greatly from a residential school trip last October. "He really enjoyed it. He became so much more independent after this trip; it was so good for him. The school gave us lots of information and we felt so confident the teachers would take good care of him."

POSITIVE COMPARISON

Mala and Sanjay were worried at first that the move from Leeds to Solihull might not be in the best interests of Aditya's schooling.

"In Leeds, our children went to a school with an 'outstanding' Ofsted rating. When we moved to Solihull and took a place at Peterbrook, at first Sanjay and I were worried the school would not be as good," says Mala.

Within a month, they realised just how unfounded those fears were. "The school has been brilliant and there's absolutely no difference to the standard of teaching or his progress. They really challenge him. The teachers praise him a lot, and this is very motivational."

BREAKFAST CLUB AND AFTER-SCHOOL PROVISION

Paws and Grizzlies wraparound childcare provision is open to all three to eleven-yearolds from 7.30am to 6.00pm each weekday.

The breakfast club is open from 7.30am until 8.45am for planned activities and a healthy breakfast for all children who attend.

The after-school provision is open from 3.15pm until 6.00 pm and includes activities from its own carefully planned curriculum. Accommodating children from all key stages.

UNIFORM

The Governors and staff believe that school uniform increases the children's pride and ownership of their school, and we insist on children wearing a school uniform. The Peterbrook uniform is a smart royal blue pullover or cardigan and grey trousers or skirts. Parents are also able to purchase non-logo uniform from other outlets.



SCHOOL MEALS AND SNACKS

LUNCH

Our delicious school lunches are provided by Solihull Catering Service. All children eat in the infant hall at lunchtime. The children can request a school meal at register time with the class teacher. Parents can pay for them in advance on ParentPay at the current price of £2.20 per day. Alternatively, children may bring in a healthy packed lunch from home.

FREE SCHOOL MEALS

All children in Reception and Years 1 and 2 are entitled to free school meals under the government's Universal Infant Free School Meals funding. If you receive benefits or have a low income, your child may be eligible for Free School Meals in Year 3 and beyond. To register for Universal Infant Free School Meals and/ or apply for Free School Meals visit Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council website at www.solihull.gov.uk/Schools-and-learning/ Free-school-meals.

MILK

Children under five are entitled to free milk and other children in school may purchase it. If you wish your child to have milk beyond their fifth birthday, please arrange this via the school

Barney Thinks Peterbrook Primary School is "Epic"!

Matthew and Leanne live in Shirley with sons Barney aged eight and Toby aged six.

There's something really special about seeing your children walk their own way down a path you once did. For Matthew, a past Peterbrook Primary School pupil, his fond memories of the school played a part in deciding where to send his sons.

Barney was enrolled in Peterbrook Primary School's nursery when he was three, and then moved into Reception when he was of school age. Starting school went smoothly thanks to the well-planned induction process, which they found reassuring, supportive and informative for both children and anxious parents.

Barney is autistic and dyspraxic, and his parents have been so appreciative of the school's support with his Special Educational Needs (SEN). Leanne suspected Barney was autistic from around the age of three. She says, "I work with SEN pupils in a senior school setting, so I informed the nursery staff of my thoughts during their home visit. They listened and supported Barney to make sense of his time at nursery. As he progressed through the school, he was placed on the SEN register and was eventually diagnosed with autism."

'We received superb support. The staff provided appropriate interventions and came up with inventive ideas to keep Barney engaged and feeling rewarded. The TAs are always there in the morning if he has a wobble COMMUNITY SPIRIT saying goodbye, and come to the playground to collect him and walk him in. It's clear Barney trusts the staff otherwise he wouldn't go wit them," says Leanne.

Barney is in Year 4 now and was recently diagnosed with dyspraxia, a common disorder affecting coordination and movement that often occurs alongside autism. "The school provided Barney with a variety of stationery to aid his handwriting, which is gradually improving," says Leanne.

Matthew and Leanne's boys have blossomed at Peterbrook Primary School. "Their progress has been brilliant! Both of our boys achieved their full set of reading ribbons well before their expected time. They are really happy with their teachers, talk about their lessons and can recall what they've learnt." says Matthew.

"It's not just academic progress; they're growing in social and emotional skills too," Leanne adds. "Toby loves school, especially the social side. He has lots of friends and enjoys

after school clubs where he can socialise with children who aren't in his class. Barney has a couple of close friends and the school are very supportive of group activities. They ensure he

feels confident with his peers."

The strong sense of community at Peterbroo Primary School is enhanced by its busy social calendar. Leanne explains, "There are themed days throughout the year for the school community to come together, all of which our boys get very excited about; especially 'Break the Rules Day'! The PTFA are superb at organising events and work hard to raise

The school community is led with passion by the senior leadership team, who are a visible presence every day. "There's always a member of SLT on the playground in the morning, making themselves available and approachable. They know my children by name, which shows me they know and treat their pupils as individuals. They're aware of Barney's SEN and are always understanding of his needs," says

Matthew adds, "The TAs, dinner time staff, support staff and the PTFA along with the teaching staff and SLT have been an indispensable team for our children's individua journeys through school."

"We have found Peterbrook to be an inclusive, friendly school with supportive staff who help our children to achieve to the best of their abilities. Both of our boys are very happy, positive and get enrichment from their school environment," says Matthew.









CREATIVE CURRICULUM: FOUNDATIONS FOR SUCCESS

BROAD AND BALANCED

The underlying principles of our approach to learning at Peterbrook is to know where all children are at, where they need to go and how they will get there. We believe that every child can achieve, and our teachers are primed to enable learning for every child in their class.

ALL AREAS OF LEARNING

In designing our curriculum, our priority was to ensure there was a clear progression in both the development of skills and knowledge acquisition. Wherever possible we use an approach, where children can make links between different areas of their learning. Children may repeat some topics as they build upon prior knowledge.

OPPORTUNITIES AND EXPERIENCES

We encourage children to take part in a variety of new opportunities and experiences that are both academic and social to discover new skills and develop a love of learning. We believe our curriculum promotes resilience and independence to enable success and happiness in the wider world.

INCLUSION: A CURRICULUM FOR ALL

SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

At Peterbrook we strive to support all children to enable them to achieve their very best at school. The school aims to ensure that all pupils, including those with learning difficulties, physical problems and the more able child, experience a broad and balanced curriculum at an appropriate level. Through this, all children will acquire the basic skills and attitudes to meet new challenges with confidence. We offer a range of enrichment activities to extend the learning of more able children both in and out of school.



MONITOR AND ASSESS

Members of the teaching staff actively monitor and assess all pupils to ensure that their individual needs are met and, when necessary, to seek the advice of external agencies. The SEND policy sets out how children with special needs are identified, assessed and supported according to their individual needs.

INCLUSIVE TEACHING

Inclusion is the responsibility of all teachers at Peterbrook, but our special needs coordinator/inclusion leader is our SENCO Mrs H Burke. Mrs H Burke is responsible for the coordination of specific provisions made for individual children with special educational needs.



Peterbrook Primary School brings out the best in your children

Catherine and James live in Shirley, Solihull with their three children - Robin aged 9 and twins Rosie and Elliott aged 7.

Choosing your children's first school is often daunting, but not for James and Catherine. They were so taken with the atmosphere at the nursery that when it came to choosing for eldest son Robin, starting in Reception at Peterbrook Primary School was simply a natural progression.

"The nursery was more friendly and personal than a private nursery. We found it such a friendly, warm and welcoming environment," says Catherine.

EDIENDI V ATMOSDHEDI

Robin is currently in Year 5 and Rosie and Elliott are in Year 2, and the friendly atmosphere that captured their hearts in the nursery has continued throughout the years. "It's a real standout thing about the school, how friendly, welcoming and supportive it is. The kids are always encouraged in everything they do. It's a lovely, positive environment," says James.

Catherine and James are thrilled to say their children are blossoming in every way at Peterbrook Primary School. "They are all shining and doing the best they can do. They are encouraged and nurtured academically. Any issues that we've had over the years have been quickly dealt with by their teachers. Rosie and Robin both needed to improve their handwriting and they were encouraged and given extra activities to do at home to support their work in school - now they're so neat!"

GROWING IN CONFIDENCE

"Elliott's gone from quite shy to a very confident little boy," continues James. "The teachers have been instrumental in this, building him up with positive reinforcement and rewards like 'star writer.' There's a variety of awards at school, and not just for academics but for confidence and trying hard."

Catherine adds, "They do a little talent show in Year 2. All of my children have taken part; they all play the piano outside of school. It's a lovely way to build confidence. Sport-wise, they are all very good runners and the school have a lovely big playing field - it's one of their great assets. They start a PE session with a mile run! And the school offers so many different sports."

JIGH STANDARDS OF REHAVIOUR

It's been so refreshing for Catherine to see all friendship issues are dealt with swiftly and taken seriously. It's clear that the school have high standards and hold everyone to account for their behaviour. She says, "They expect respect from everyone. The teachers are quick to deal with issues and everyone feels heard and validated. They have peer-to-peer support available on the playground to resolve issues, too."



WHAT THE CHILD SAYS:

Robin tells us, "The teachers are brilliant at solving friendship issues, especially the Headteacher Mrs
Thorne who is very fair."

Elliott says, "I enjoy the different after-school clubs, especially learning Martial Arts."

"I think that the school is very nice and the teachers are friendly," says Rosie.

RESPONSIBILIT\

Peer-to-peer support is something that is encouraged throughout the school, including giving children the opportunity to be reading buddies for younger peers. "Robin goes and helps Year 1 children with their reading. It's been so fantastic for his confidence and he comes home really proud of the progress his mentees are making. It's made him want to combine his love for geography with the pride he's felt helping others learn and become a geography teacher," explains Catherine.

PASTORAL CARE

James believes the school's pastoral care is excellent and really helped when Rosie was suffering from post-COVID anxiety. "She was swiftly referred to pastoral support and they just talked to her and did activities with her. Within six weeks she was her normal, happy self again and I put that down to the nurture she was shown by the school."

GLOWING RECOMMENDATIONS

Catherine says, "We recommend the school a lot to neighbours and friends. We always tell people it's just so nurturing and supportive. It just brings the best out in your kids!"

The primary school admissions team at Solihull council is the admissions authority, responsible for the admissions policies and decisions on applications for admission. Telephone 0121 704 6693 or email admissions@solihull.gov.uk.

NURSERY ADMISSIONS

Contact Peterbrook Primary School on 0121 430 2545 or email admissions@peterbrook. solihull.sch.uk. There are three admissions periods for nursery pupils:

January intake - closing date for applications is in November prior to the January start date.

Post-Easter intake - the closing date for applications is in February prior to an April start

September intake - the closing date for applications is in March prior to a September start date.

STARTING SCHOOL FOR THE **FIRST TIME**

You will need to apply for a place by contacting the schools' admissions team at Solihull Council. Applications are made from November to January in the year before the one in which your child is due to start school. If your application is not successful, you will be invited The Parent Teacher Friend Association (PTFA) to join the waiting list. If you are offered a place, your child will be welcomed to the school in September.

IN-YEAR ADMISSIONS

If you wish to transfer your child into our school during any academic year you are welcome to visit the school and then submit your application to the admissions team. Once this has been processed your child will be able to start with us immediately.

SPORT

Sport is very important to us at Peterbrook Primary School. For many years in a row, we have achieved a Gold Level achievement from The School Games Mark. This is a governmentled award scheme facilitated by the Youth Sport Trust to reward schools for their commitment to the development of sporting competition across their schools and communities. Each academic year Sports Councillors are elected for each year group.

We also have thriving girls and boys football teams, and a netball team which we encourage both boys and girls to participate.

SWIMMING LESSONS

In addition to PE and sports opportunities, children are offered swimming lessons in Year 3 and Year 5.

MUSIC

We believe that music is a universal language that can inspire and motivate people. This motivates us to ensure the effective delivery of a music curriculum that can be enjoyed and accessed by all children. In Year 4, the children learn to play a brass or string instrument as part of our free Wider Opportunities Music Programme, culminating in a fantastic concert with other schools in Solihull at Warwick Arts Centre.

CHARANGA

We use a classroom-based, participatory approach to musical development at Peterbrook called 'Charanga'. This scheme ensures that children are actively involved in using and developing their singing voices, using body percussion and learning to play classroom instruments.

SPECIALISTS

Class teachers deliver most musical learning opportunities supported by specialists from Solihull Music Service as well as additional opportunities like peripatetic lessons, music residential trips and a thriving school choir. Individual specialist music tuition is also available for children who would like to learn violin, guitar or brass instruments. These lessons are paid for by parents.
