Supportive staff

Xia and Meiqi have been highly satisfied with the quality of teaching at Woodlands Primary School where they have seen both of their children flourish. Xia says: "Alex and Brooke have always had their talents encouraged by the teachers, who are very dedicated and prepared to go to a lot of trouble to cater for each child's different interests.'

Happy environment

"All the teachers who taught Alex were very good with him and the children's different needs," Xia says. we felt they were always very approachable. If we ever had to contact them about anything, they would get back to us quickly, Xia says.

Although Brooke is four years younger than Alex, she had an equally good experience after she started at the school and she also made some great friends there. "She has now formed lasting friendships with many of them and once again their parents have also become good friends of ours," Xia says.

Exam success

"Brooke is now in Year Six at Woodlands Primary. All her teachers have been lovely along the way and I know that she will be very sad to leave the school and move up to secondary school next year. She has also now passed the 11 Plus exam and she will be going to an all-girls grammar school," Xia says.

WHAT ARE OUR SCHOOL TIMES?

School starts at 8.45am (registration) and finishes at 3.15pm, allowing for 32.5 hours of education per week.

Wraparound care

We offer a breakfast and an after-school club, run on the premises by Rainbow School Club.

Additionally, we run a breakfast club specifically to help and encourage pupils who have separation difficulties or find it hard to come into school. The pupils are invited to attend after consultation with staff and parents.

UNIFORM

To ensure a standard of dress and to create a sense of unity and belonging, we take pride in the wearing of our royal blue and grey uniform.

FOOD IN SCHOOL

Fresh and nutritious school lunches are prepared on site, based on healthy eating guidelines. Fruit and vegetable snacks are provided in Reception, Year I and Year 2, and we encourage older children to bring in these from home.

All EYFS (Year R) children are given a drink of milk, and water is available to everyone throughout the day. Packed lunches should be as healthy as possible – we do not allow sweets, chocolate or sweetened and fizzy drinks.

Free school meals

All children in Reception and Years I and 2 are entitled to free school meals under the government's Universal Infant Free School Meals funding. If you receive benefits or have a low income, your child may be eligible for Free School Meals in Year 3 and beyond.

Kind teachers

Sam and Hugh love the happy environment of Woodlands Primary, where everyone knows everyone, even though it is a big school. "Matilda and Oscar are having a great experience there and the staff are motivating them to achieve their best," Sam says.

Welcoming atmosphere

"We had heard good things about Woodlands and moved to live in the area so that our children could attend the school. It is in a lovely setting with woodland next to it, where the Reception children spend a lot of time and do Forest School. We liked the fact it was a big school where the children get plenty of opportunities. We attended the Christmas Fair before Matilda started and thought it was a lovely atmosphere, where the community were made to feel welcome."

Loving school life

Matilda went into Reception at the age of 4 and loved it immediately. "She was thrilled to go on her first day and proud to wear her uniform. The teachers were welcoming and the classroom was lovely. From that day onwards, she has always enjoyed school. She liked playing outside on the climbing frames and in the stream in the woods, because the children go outside in all weathers. She has enjoyed all the opportunities she has been given and loved performing in productions and being on the School Council. She does her schoolwork with pride and likes seeing it on display," Sam says.

Wonderful support

"When Matilda was in Reception, she was diagnosed with a brain tumour, which came as a big shock to us. But we were overwhelmed with love and support from all the staff, the children, and the other parents. Thankfully, Matilda was fine afterwards and only missed three weeks of school and then had a phased return. The staff were aware of her needs and we knew they would take good care of her at school," she says.

Fast progress

"Her class were incredible and, even though they hadn't known her long, they sent her cards and gifts and made her a video.
Although Woodlands is big, the Headteacher knew who she was and would speak to us, and to Oscar.

Matilda is in Year 2 now and making great progress. She loves writing stories, learning phonics, and reading. The teachers know her strengths and push her to achieve her best."

Smooth transition

Sam says Oscar also loves the school. "He was used to the classroom and teacher when he started in Reception because they gave him the same ones Matilda had. The staff came to the house to see him before he started. They get to know all the children well and are very nurturing. He has made some good friends and now enjoys going to school to see them each day. He is progressing well with his reading, phonics, and maths."

Rewarding hard work

Sam and Hugh like the way the staff motivate the children to do well by giving awards to those who try hard. "Oscar recently received an Endeavour award for maths, and Matilda was given an Ambassador letter in assembly for demonstrating the values of the school in the things that she does. Oscar and Matilda are also fortunate to have been able to enjoy a wide variety of free after school clubs," Sam says.

CURRICULUM: DEVELOPING HAPPY, KIND PEOPLE

OUR WOODLANDS CURRICULUM

The curriculum represents the totality of the experience of our pupils within schooling. It is anything that is planned and designed to sequentially improve pupils' knowledge and skills. At Woodlands, pupils have access to an enriched educational experience.

The Best Version of Ourselves

Our aim is to create happy, kind people, who show resilience in the face of challenge and who strive to be the best version of themselves. Wrapped around our aim are three broad aspects of our curriculum: Personal Development, The National Curriculum and Extra-Curricular:

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT: RESPONSIBLE, RESPECTFUL AND ACTIVE

Personal Development is consistently promoted at Woodlands. We want our pupils to grow into responsible, respectful and active people who are able to play their part and become involved in public life as adults. We also aim to help develop pupils' confidence, resilience and knowledge so that they can keep themselves mentally healthy. Every interaction we have with pupils helps them on this journey, but there are a number of deliberately planned strategies, which are central to Personal Development. These include (amongst others) the integration of our two big ideas: Diversity and Culture, and through our Jigsaw PSHE programme (Personal. Social, Health and Economic Education) and the exploration of our core values in assemblies and lessons.

NATIONAL CURRICULUM

Every National Curriculum subject is valued and taught consistently across the school to provide the very best education. Reading is at the heart of all we do and it features across our curriculum. The school libraries and classroom book areas are full of a wide range of rich texts for all tastes. English and mathematics are the bedrock of primary education, and we prioritise the acquisition of key knowledge in these subjects. However, we are determined that our pupils experience a rich and varied educational experience encompassing all subjects, which provides them with sufficient time for deep learning to occur. EXTRA-CURRICULAR: A RICH SET OF EXPERIENCES AND OPPORTUNITIES

DIVERSE ACTIVITIES

There is also a diverse extra-curricular menu of activities in place that strengthens our offer. Pupils have access to a wide, rich set of experiences and opportunities to develop their talents and interests. There is a strong take-up by pupils of the opportunities provided. Examples include a range of after-school clubs, visits from writers, actors and musicians, Forest School and performances to parents. Homework is set at an age-appropriate level, allowing for additional learning on top of this for those who choose it.

EXTENSIVE GROUNDS

Woodlands is a stunning site with a vast outdoor area, in which children take part in Forest School and other activities. Children enjoy a large playing field and playgrounds, wildlife area with a pond, a wellbeing garden and an outdoor stage. We encourage children to keep fit by utilising the field, MUGA (multi-use games area), climbing apparatus and playgrounds at break times.

SCHOOL TRIPS

We undertake a range of trips to places of interest each year, and recently these have included:

- Bedgebury Arboretum
- Hastings
- The Science Museum
- Kent Life Museum
- Local secondary schools for sports, art and DT.

In Years 5 and 6, the children go onresidential visits to learn team work and determination and to celebrate their journey together at Woodlands.



INCLUSION: AN EDUCATION FOR ALL

SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS **AND DISABILITIES**

All children are valued, respected and welcomed to the school whatever their additional educational need. We will support their learning and ensure they are fully included in all school activities as far as possible, making full use of externally provided facilities and advice where appropriate.

At Woodlands, we provide for every kind of frequently occurring special educational need, including those without a formal diagnosis. Examples of this are dyslexia, developmental coordination disorder (which includes dyspraxia), speech and language needs, autism spectrum condition, learning difficulties, and social, emotional and mental health difficulties.

We meet needs through high quality teaching in the first instance, with additional resources utilised where appropriate. We aim for children to learn in the classroom environment whenever possible.

Decisions on the admission of pupils with an Education, Health and Care plan are made by the Local Authority in consultation with school.

Nurture and pastoral support are key parts of our inclusive practice. We have an Inclusion Team, including Ralfie the dog, who support pupils and families in many

Enthusiastic pupils

Naomi and Freddie are delighted their children are happy and doing well educationally in the lovely surroundings of Woodlands Primary School. Naomi says: "Bea, who is in Year 2, loves reading and writing stories and talks to us about what she is learning. Monty is thriving in Reception and loves writing and spelling and for a long time. He is confident about everything and thriving learning outdoors."

Good reputation

The family live close to Woodlands Primary and the children went to preschool on the site so Naomi and Freddie always knew it was a well-regarded school. Applications for a place should be made through Kent County Council (www.kent.gov.uk/education-andchildren/ schools/school-places/admissions-criteria).

We are an inclusive school that welcomes children from all backgrounds and abilities from ages 4 to 11. The only restriction we place on entry is that of number. Our pupil admission number is 90 (or 60 in years with a low birth rate). Please enquire to clarify this ahead of the admissions process.
