This is regularly used and maintained by the Conservation and Gardening Club.

Playgrounds

our extensive school grounds include three hard surface play areas to support the range of ages in the school and two football pitches. The playgrounds include the Trim Trails, Bumble Bee Multi-Shooter, two basketball nets and a variety of playground markings. Children have access to a wide range of playtime equipment and our Year 5 Buddies ensure that there is always someone to play with!

Library

We have a wonderful library, with a wide range of reading material, a listening station and 'Junior Librarian' equipment, which enables our library monitors to scan books in and out of the database.

Uniform

Our concern for these high standards is also reflected in the pride we take in our school uniform and the feeling of belonging it creates. Autumn term

The school covers the Foundation Stage (Reception), Key Stage 1 (five to seven years) and Key Stage 2 (eight to 11 years). Children are eligible to start at East Wittering Primary School in the autumn term of the academic year in which they will have their fifth birthday.

Moving on to secondary school

At the end of Key Stage 2, children can choose to attend one of several schools. These include: Bishop Luffa School (Chichester), Chichester High School for Boys, Chichester High School for Girls, The Academy (Selsey) and St. Philip Howard R.C. School (Barnham)

The children are also invited to spend an induction day at their new schools. Transfer is often a nervous time for the children and so we make every effort to ensure that this algoes as smoothly as possible.
