As a school, we are committed to providing the very, very best learning opportunities for your child in a safe, secure and friendly environment.

### **Opportunities**

All pupils at Watton at Stone will have the opportunity to:

- learn to speak a language

### Preparation for modern life

Preparing pupils for life in Modern Britain and the demands of the 21st Century is a key focus. This means that we have a strong emphasis on using technology as a learning tool. We have subscribed to a fantastic resource called Purple Mash and have invested in our IT equipment and devices so that the children from pre-school to Year 6 have more opportunities to use these across the curriculum.

In order to prepare the children at Watton for the world outside of the education setting, we also place much importance on educating the children around diversity and online safety.

### High expectations

There is no limit on how well all pupils can achieve. We have the highest expectations for all of our children expect them to aim high and to achieve their full potential. I feel it is important that pupils at Watton at Stone achieve academically as well as developing their personal and social skills, both in and out of school.

### **Nurture Support**

At Watton at Stone Primary we want everyone involved with our school to feel well supported. We believe that good pastoral support focuses on nurturing the individual needs of each child. We aim to build trusting and empathic relationships with all our pupils and their families. All our staff model to students how to look after themselves and others; encouraging them to seek help, support or advice whenever they need it.

We are currently working towards the PSQM (Primary Science Quality Mark) award. PSQM enables confident, knowledgeable, reflective leadership which results in an improvement in the way in which science is strategically planned and taught across the whole school.

We are also working towards the Herts EYQS (Early Years Quality Standard) award. This is a research and development project which 'makes a difference' to outcomes for children. The EYQS scheme provides thought provoking challenge, brings fresh perspectives and promotes continuous quality improvement in line with current practice.

# School day: settling in

## **School hours**

- School starts at 8:50am and ends at 3:15pm

## **Attendance and Punctuality**

Regular attendance at school is one of the most important factors which will affect a child's success. Any absence from school will interrupt a child's learning, and repeated or extended absence also affects the child's social development. The school's and Government's expectation is that the average attendance of all pupils should be at least 95%, which means less than 10 days absent throughout the year. The school must be notified if a child is going to be off ill. The current law does not give any entitlement to parents to take their child on holiday during term time. Any application for leave must be in exceptional circumstances and the Headteacher will check this. Our attendance policy can be found on the school website.



# Wraparound care

### **Breakfast Club**

Breakfast Club is available from 7,45am - 8,50am Monday to Friday for children from Reception to Year 6. Children are offered a wide choice of breakfast options including a range of cereals and toasted products such as bagels, crumpets and toast, and every day there is a selection of board games, puzzles, construction toys and colouring for the children to enjoy until the school day starts.

### After School Club

After School Club is available from 3.15pm – 5.45pm Monday to Friday for children from Reception to Year 6. Children eat a healthy snack which typically includes a choice of rice cakes, crackers, breadsticks, fruit and yoghurt. At After School Club children can choose from a range of games and activities indoors, and also enjoy lots of time outside playing football and tennis, using the trim trail and playing team games like 40-40 home. We also regularly offer special activities such as bracelet making, biscuit decorating and movie afternoons.

### **Holiday Club**

We work alongside external companies to provide holiday club provision throughout the year. We consult with parents to ensure that there is enough interest in order for the clubs to operate.

### Uniform

We have a compulsory school uniform:

- Green jumpers or cardigans (preferably with school logo)
- White shirts or blouses
- Grey trousers, skirts or pinafores
- Black school shoes

## Food in school

School meals are provided by Herts Catering Limited, who supply us with high quality, healthy and nutritious food, with an emphasis on local produce and seasonal ingredients. Children have a range of options to choose from, including a vegetarian offer. There is always a salad bar, jacket potatoes with various fillings, and fruit and vegetables. We operate a 'mix and match' system, where children can opt for a meal containing their favourite foods. Parents can check their child's choices through our online ordering system.

### **Packed lunches**

Children may prefer to bring a packed lunch from home. In accordance with our healthy eating policy, we do not allow fizzy drinks, sweets or chocolate in lunch boxes, and we are a strictly nut free school, due to allergies. Alternatively, we can provide a packed lunch from our kitchen on

All children sit and eat together, regardless of whether they are having a school meal or a packed lunch.

### Drinks and snacks

Children in Key Stage 1 receive a piece of fruit and a drink of milk at breaktime. Water is available to all children throughout the day.

#### Free school meals

Children in Reception Class, Year 1 and Year 2 are entitled to receive a free school meal under the Universal Free School Meal entitlement.

We want our children to learn from other cultures, respect diversity, co-operate with one another and appreciate what they have. We achieve this by providing a strong SMSC curriculum, with British Values and our core values placed at the heart of everything we do. We enrich their time in our school with memorable, unforgettable experiences and provide opportunities which are normally out of reach.

# **Positive learning behaviours**

Our school learning behaviours are evident in all that we do at Watton; children are taught about the elements of each learning behaviour and begin to understand the importance that we place on each. Assemblies are used to introduce and explore these in greater depth. By emphasising the importance of these, we aim to embed these learning behaviours within our curriculum, our staff and our pupils.

## **Early Years**

Our Early Years provision is an integral part of our school and builds the foundations for children's education. We work closely with parents and children to build nurturing environments which enable children to grow socially, emotionally, physically and academically. Children explore the seven areas of learning set out in the Early Years Foundation Stage framework and have the opportunity to flourish in their own way. Our stimulating classrooms encourage independence and the opportunity for children to achieve the ambitions we have created for them at Watton through our bespoke curriculum.



# Enriched curriculum: trips, visitors, clubs, music and outdoor learning

# **Trips**

Throughout the year, we organise different visits off site to further enhance our curriculum. Recent trips have included:

- Harvest Festival visit to Church.
- 4 Residential trip to Hudnell Park.
- 6 Residential trip to PGL.
- Choir singing to local residents at Christmas.
- Puppet Theatre trip for children in Rec and KS1.
- Year 3 Development afternoon at Wodson. The children took part in cross curricular orienteering, skipping challenge, Games skills and ABC (ability, balance and coordination).
- Year 6 Tag Rugby Festival.

### **Visitors**

Throughout the school year, we are fortunate to have various visitors to help bring our curriculum to life, including visits from:

- Visits from inspirational speakers.
- The Fire Service.
- Theatre company visits.
- Visiting Farm.
- Assemblies led by local Church leaders.

## Clubs

Children have the opportunity to take part in a wide range of activities during the mid-day break and after school. These are run voluntarily by staff and may vary each year dependent on the expertise available. Clubs typically include:

### Music

In recent years, we have enhanced our music provision so that all children have the chance to learn a musical instrument and the basics of composition. We have a school choir which performs at community events. These are enjoyed by all the children, not only those with a special talent. We also offer one to one tuition for guitar and drumming.

# **Outdoor learning**

We are extremely lucky to have a great outdoor learning facility on our school site. We have developed our curriculum to include as much outdoor learning as possible. The outdoor classroom enables us to keep learning outside whatever the weather too! All class teachers aim to teach 2 - 3 lessons per week outdoors as well as weekly P.E. lessons too.

When visiting the school, you might see children on a minibeast hunt, doing cross curriculum orienteering or many other exciting outdoor activities.

### Forest school: a unique educational experience

Forest School is a unique educational experience and process that offers children the opportunity to succeed and develop confidence and self-esteem through hands-on learning experiences in a woodland environment. Children will work with tools, light fires, play, explore, challenge and learn boundaries of behaviour; both physical and social. They will grow in confidence, self-esteem and motivation whilst developing an understanding of the natural world.

# Wellbeing

# **Our P.E. and Sport Vision**

At Watton School we place a high value on P.E. and sport to help our pupils achieve their full potential, from inspiring the more tentative to actively participate in P.E. and clubs, to encouraging competitive sports for the more able. We promote a long-term healthy lifestyle through a broad and balanced curriculum with an aim to raise enjoyment, attainment and make physical activity a staple part of the pupils' daily routine.

Our P.E. and sport provision aspires to build self-esteem, teamwork, leadership skills and a desire to be the best that they can be.

### Competition

Every year, each year group attends a sporting competition, in association with Herts and Ware Sports Association. These events involve every child, whatever their ability, and do not focus on just the most talented. We believe in inclusivity and arrange specific events for children with special educational needs or disabilities.

### The Daily Mile

The Daily Mile is a simple but ground-breaking initiative, encouraging primary schools and nurseries to take children outside running for 15 minutes each day. The aim of The Daily Mile is to improve the physical, emotional, social health and wellbeing of children, regardless of age or personal circumstances, to create healthy habits for life.

# **Special Educational Needs**

At Watton at Stone, our SEND policy is implemented consistently by all staff. We identify barriers to learning as early as possible and provide appropriately to meet a diversity of needs. We make sure that all pupils have access to a broad and balanced curriculum that is appropriately adapted, and recognise, value and celebrate pupil achievement in all areas.

We work in partnership with parents/carers in supporting their child's education, and with outside agencies to ensure information is shared promptly and effectively. Importantly, we take into account the feelings and opinions of children with SEND when planning all learning opportunities.
