Then you will choose one of the fun activities your teacher has put out for you and play until everyone has arrived.


Mia and Filip are playing with counters. "This is fun!" says Mia.

If you want to go outside, we have sand and water tables. bikes and scooters, and lots of space to play.




What happens when I need the toilet?
