

What happens when I come into school?

Your grown-up will take you into school through the green gate, like Sophie and her mum are doing. When you come into school, you will put your coat on your own coat peg. Jack and Freddie have found their pegs.

What do you like doing with your friends?


What if I am hungry or thirsty?
