

What happens when I come into school?

There are lots of activities for you to enjoy at school, such as



At mid-morning playtime, you can have a healthy snack you brought from home.


At lunchtime, you will wash your hands before you sit down in the classroom to eat. Then, you will get your lunchbox and have the healthy lunch you brought to school.

Skills for school

You can practise some things at home so that they are easy to do by yourself when you start school.

At home, you can practise:

- Taking your shoes off and putting them on
- · Taking your coat off and putting it on
- · Fastening your zips and buttons by yourself
- · Going to the toilet by yourself
- · Washing and drying your hands
- Holding a book and turning the pages.
