

What happens when I get to school?

Jane is going to the toilet.


"Everything is just the right size for me so that it is easier to use the toilet by myself!" she says.

You can go whenever you need to. Just remember to tell


Jane has been to the toilet and remembered to flush. Now she is washing her hands carefully with soap and warm water.
