Becky's son Alex is in Year 6.

Becky chose St Mary's because she felt it was the right place for Alex and could offer the support he needs

"It's a little scary to think Alex's time at St Mary's is ending. It's not sunk in for either of us yet. He is excited and he's ready for the discipline and structure of secondary school. We knew St Mary's had a good reputation for children with SEN. It was the flexibility and accommodating way St Mary's interacted with us from the very beginning that I liked, they even arranged for us to come and visit the day after the teachers' end of term barbecue so when we arrived, they were still tidying up. It was this openness that made it feel like the right place for Alex. It was tiring for him when he first started, but he enjoyed it from day one and settled in with the change of going to school every day much quicker than I did!" said Becky.

A caring and consistent approach

"They've always had a caring approach and I knew they had experience with children with Down Syndrome. The SEN lead has been great and she's been there the whole time. There has been consistency with the teaching staff. Alex has had the same TA for the last two years. He absolutely adores her and he's built trust with her. She understands how he works and what works for him and when he's getting tired, it's been brilliant. He's also had very good teachers who have understood how he thinks and how he behaves and they've known how to get the best out of him," said Becky.

SEN support that adapts naturally

"We've adapted as we've gone along. I remember when he moved into Year 1, by coincidence his teacher had direct experience with children with Down Syndrome, so I was happy to know she'd have an understanding. She helped establish a way of working. It can be difficult getting information from Alex about his day, but we have home-school communication books and they help me stay on top of what's happening. We have face to face longer meetings every term where we discuss targets and progress with his teacher, the SEN lead, and his TA, and we go

through things in more detail. We also have a longer annual review his Education and Health Care plan," said

Paris, Pendarren, Panathlon and pool

"They went on a trip to Paris last year. They had a residential trip to Wales which I was worried about but school were amazing and I trusted them completely. They sent a report of the trip to a local magazine and they included a great photo of Alex, so that's something we'll remember. Alex has also taken part in many Panathlon Challenges which is a sport event for children with SEN When it came to Alex going swimming, we needed someone to be in the pool with him and the school administrator stepped forward to help, I remember she said, "No child gets left behind," and that's just one example of what life is like at St Mary's," said Becky.

Go and see it for yourself

"I'd recommend any parent, especially if your child has SEN, to go and talk to the SEN lead or SLT, go and see the school and talk to the parents. In the beginning the SEN lead ran coffee mornings on a Friday where parents would meet and that was brilliant, it's how Alex joined a football team for kids with Down Syndrome," said Becky.

Moving on

"I don't know how many friends Alex will keep once he moves to high school, but they have all really looked after him, they've got a really nice bond, they're very caring and the kids look out for one another. We were walking home recently, and a boy just came up and said hello to Alex. He's now in secondary school but he'd been at after school club with Alex and remembered him - that felt lovely," said

Parent and Toddler Group

We also have a Parent & Toddler Group, which runs every Monday (term time only) from 9.30am to 10.30am at our Church Lane site which includes a music session with our music teacher.

Breakfast Club and After School Club

We run Breakfast Clubs and After School Clubs at Church Lane and Rectory Gardens for all children from Nursery to Year 6. This includes a healthy breakfast and light meal.

Uniform

Food in school

We work very closely with our school meals provider Olive Dining to offer our children tasty, attractive and nutritionally balanced meals they will enjoy.

Free school meals

Currently all pupils in Reception, Year 1 and 2 are eligible for universal infant free school meals. Years 3, 4, 5 & 6 are receiving a Mayor free school meal which has been extended to the next academic year.

Packed lunches

Children are also welcome to bring their own lunch and break time snacks from home. In line with our food policy, we do not allow crisps, biscuits or chocolate.

Snacks and drinks

Early Year's and Key Stage 1 children are provided with a healthy piece of fruit, while Key Stage 2 children are encouraged to bring their own fruit snack. Only water is allowed in school, except for children who have registered for our School Milk Scheme. Parents may apply through the school office. School milk is free for Nursery and Reception aged children.

Support from the start

"Prince is my eldest son and he has finished at St Mary's and has moved to Riverside School. He's autistic and has been supported by St Mary's from his first day all the way through to Year 6. I'm very happy with St Mary's and how they provided support for Prince through his schooling. He's had the support of the teachers and his classmates The class team were always helpful, he felt very cared for," said Grace.

Open and easy communication

"Emmanuel and Frank are doing very well. St Mary's has been part of our life now for so long. I've loved going to the coffee mornings when I have time and I have lots of lovely memories. From my experience I think St Mary's is amazing. The teachers are friendly and welcoming. If ever there is something bothering me or I don't understand something, I just go straight to them, they are open and easy to communicate with," said Grace.

Moving forward as a community

"Around two years ago, some parents were very distracted by the school's Ofsted report. It wasn't as good as we'd hoped it to be. I couldn't believe it, I was shocked. I still don't understand why it came out the way it did. Some parents decided to move their children, but many of us didn't. St Mary's is a good school. After the report we met with the Headteacher at the time, he's now retired, and he took the time to chat to us all and help us to understand, that helped very much. A couple of months later, Ofsted came back and said the school was good, so I know it was the correct decision to stay at St Mary's," said Grace.

Caring for parents and children

"They always help as best they can and if they can't they pass you to someone who can. At Christmas they look after the parents that are on low incomes and make sure they receive what they need, this is what makes them special. Parents are always encouraged to come into school, they're invited to the Harvest Time assembly and the Christmas concert. There is no pressure. They take the time

to listen to you and they are patient, they know it's not easy and they help when they can. They check in to make sure people are doing okay and they look after all the children as individuals," said Grace.

Children are settled and enjoy school

"The children love it when parents are invited to watch them. The boys love it when I come into school to see them perform. Emmanuel plays the recorder and Frank plays the violin. Getting awarded 'Star of the Week' motivates them and it's lovely to see their hard work and kindness to others being recognised. They all love being in the playground and playing, enjoying their free time. When the teachers reward them with more time in the playground, it makes them happy. The teachers make sure the children understand what is expected and they are consistent and fair," said Grace.

Part of a family

"I don't want to think about the boys not being at St Mary's. I've volunteered on my days off and gone in and helped at school, that's how much I've loved the boys being there. Prince continues to do well since leaving. He's coming home after school and telling me about his friends and his uniform. His speech has improved and St Mary's helped give him a good start," said Grace.

Go and visit

"To anyone thinking of sending their child to St Mary's I would suggest they go and visit, take their child into the school and go and experience it. I've been with the school for seven years now and I've never regretted it. When Prince left, we wrote a letter to the Headteacher thanking them for everything," said Grace.

Curriculum: aspire, flourish and achieve

Outward facing

Our curriculum has been designed to reflect the background and experience of our children. It is outward facing, setting learning in local, national and global contexts wherever possible.

Our curriculum also celebrates our diverse and inclusive school family: in turn supporting our children to aspire, flourish and achieve, in line with our school vision and values.

Mastering basic skills

We believe strongly in the importance of mastering basic key skills such in reading, writing, speaking and listening and numeracy - and, on the importance of developing a wide vocabulary - as these form the foundation for success in all other curriculum areas and thereby supports children to make good progress which in turn facilitates success in later life.

Specialist teachers

Our innovative use of specialist teachers in Music, Art, PE and French is a rare advantage not commonly found in most schools which enables our pupils to thrive beyond the core curriculum which contributes to improved confidence, well-being and a richer, more balanced education.

Our Music curriculum engages and inspires children, fostering their love for, and interest in Music. It helps develop their skills and confidence in playing musical instruments and nurtures their critical engagement - so that children themselves are eventually able to appraise and compose their own pieces of music.

In Year 4 every child gets to learn a musical instrument free of charge with the option to continue this to the end of Year 6.

In Year 4 they can learn the violin or the trumpet/trombone. They also learn the recorder in Year 3. The choir practise weekly and take part in a range of events such as performing at Alexandra Palace and the Royal Albert Hall.

Physical Education

Our fundamental aim is to install a lifelong love of sport, physical and outdoor activities by ensuring the children's early experiences of PE are challenging, stimulating and positive. We offer a range of different sports such as gymnastics, tennis, basketball, football, swimming and many more. We enter many tournaments over the school year such as a local cycling league, cross country, football, rugby, athletics, curling and Boccia. going on to represent Haringey in many activities at both a local and a national level.

Having a specialist art teacher at St Mary's brings significant benefits to children's learning and development. With expert knowledge and skills, a specialist can deliver high-quality, engaging art lessons that nurture creativity, critical thinking, and self-expression. Their guidance helps children develop fine motor skills and visual literacy, while also supporting cross-curricular links that enhance overall academic achievement.

French

Having a specialist French teacher from Nursery to Year 6 gives children an exciting and consistent introduction to language learning. With expert knowledge and engaging lessons, they help children build strong foundations in listening, speaking, and cultural awareness from an early age. This is further cemented by our annual day trip to Paris. This not only boosts confidence and communication skills but also supports cognitive development and prepares pupils for future language success. Starting early ensures that children see language learning as fun, natural, and a part of everyday life.

Za'ni moved from Leicester having had a tough start to school

"I moved Za'ni from his school in Leicester to St Mary's at the beginning of Year 5. I felt Za'ni wasn't in a supportive environment and he wasn't fulfilling his potential, there was a risk he was being let down by his school and I wanted to turn things around for him. He was being portrayed in a way at his old school that felt negative, so I moved him for a fresh start." said Zevron.

A new start and a new chance to thrive

"When he joined St Mary's, the teachers and staff worked with us to assess what Za'ni needed and now he is thriving. He's now in class, every day, sitting with the other students and doing well. It's a huge credit to the staff at St Mary's to see the change in Za'ni and to see how well he's doing, I knew he was highly capable and could do the work, he just needed to be given a chance and get the right support," said Zevron.

Playing basketball and sharing news of his day

"He does have a support plan and we're working with school on this. It would be great to think that this will change in the future as he's doing so well and showing such progress. Za'ni comes home now and shares his day with me, it's always positive feedback about what he's been doing and he's enjoying learning everything. He plays basketball, he's playing for a team, Enfield Scorpions and he's very active with that. I'm helping him and supporting his training as I played professionally so it's great to be able to support his dreams and goals of wanting to play professionally too," said Zevron.

Helping him to fly

"Za'ni has settled in well, he's making friends and the staff all seem to like him and have good things to share about how he's doing. He seems pretty popular. We're not thinking too far ahead at the moment, just concentrating on each day and making the most of it, seeing him on this new path is more than enough for now, thinking to where he was and where he is now, I'm just so grateful to St Mary's, it's a wonderful school. I had some feedback from a teacher recently where they thought had Za'ni had a different start he'd most likely be a top student, so that's the aim, to help him fly now, he's got so much potential, I want to help him achieve it," said Zevron.

Inclusion: an education for all

Inclusion Team

The inclusion Team works closely together to ensure that every child's needs are met, regardless of their individual requirements They collaborate with parents, carers, and class staff to provide tailored support, helping each child reach their full potential academically, socially, and emotionally.

Special educational needs

Our aims for pupils with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) are the same as for all our pupils: to provide a broad and balanced curriculum where every child can reach their full potential. We believe that all children, regardless of their needs or barriers, should experience life in all its fullness This vision is reflected in our approach to teaching, curriculum enrichment opportunities, and the thoughtful adaptations we make to ensure that every pupil with SEND is fully supported.

Our school is spread across two sites, both within walking distance of each other. Each site has undergone extensive refurbishment to ensure full accessibility. The Rectory Gardens site is equipped with a lift, while the Church Lane site is fully accessible and located on a single level.

Able and aifted

We recognise that every child is an individual, with their own specific needs, gifts, and talents. Children who are identified as exceptionally able or talented are closely monitored and provided with stimulating, enriching lessons tailored to their needs. We also offer opportunities for these pupils to meet and collaborate with other gifted children in the area, further enhancing their learning and development.

Inclusion teacher

At St Mary's, our inclusion teacher delivers targeted, short-

term intervention and catch-up programs designed to support individual children. These focused sessions are tailored to address specific areas of need, helping children build confidence and strengthen their skills in a nurturing environment. By working closely with classroom teachers, the Intervention Teacher ensures that each child receives the personalised support they need to make progress and achieve their full potential.

EAL teacher

Our English as an Additional Language (EAL) teacher plays a key role in supporting both children and adults in their language learning journey. Our teacher runs engaging workshops for adults to help them improve their English skills, fostering stronger communication and integration within the school community. Children are provided with targeted support, helping children develop their language skills to enhance their learning and confidence across all subjects.

A welcoming and nurturing school

"The children are happy at school, they have great friends. It's a strange feeling to have one child coming to the end of their primary school journey and one just starting out. St Mary's is still a lovely, nurturing school, filled with welcoming and friendly faces. When we first looked around, we were impressed that every class had a TA assigned and the enrichment programme is fantastic." said Grace.

Dedicated teachers who teach specialist **subjects**

"Having teachers dedicated to teaching French, Music, Art and Sport has made a huge difference to our children. Knowing the children are getting dedicated time each week with specialists in their field is great. Learning to speak a different language has been important for all of them and they've picked up different interests because they've been introduced to lots of different, creative and sporting activities. Frank plays the piano, both he and Ada love art, and Ada has taken up gymnastics so it's been great to see them develop these interests," said Tim.

Trips to Paris and Peer Mediation

"The trip to Paris was brilliant, it happens every year for children in Year 5. It's a one-day trip where they leave at 5am. They travel on the Eurostar to Paris and it's seen as almost a rite of passage, they have so much fun and make lovely memories."

"Frank has been part of the Peer Mediation Scheme since Year 2. It's a brilliant initiative that teaches the children how to listen. support and problem solve. It provides kids with the opportunity to interact and learn with children in other year groups and Frank's confidence has blossomed knowing he has fellow peer mediators in older years," said Tim.

Making friends and celebrating with fireworks

"We've made friendships with other parents and there is lots to get involved with at school. There are the traditional events like the summer and Christmas fairs. We do an annual barbecue which is fantastic, we get a DJ and from the school grounds we have a brilliant view of Alexandra Palace. We tie it in with their fireworks display too, it's a very special event that happens every year," said Grace.

Support for every child

"Having had Ada go from start to finish at St Mary's we have seen changes in the staff, but more so at senior level. The classroom teaching staff have always been consistent, and sometimes TAs have stayed with classes as they've moved up through the school if they've bonded particularly well with a class. School put the needs of the children first. Each child has five people they know they can turn to if they need help with anything. They draw around their hand and write down the names of the five people and this is displayed in school. I think it's a great way for the children to develop and learn about having a support network and having different people to go to for different

Opportunities to perform on the sports field and on the stage

"The sporting event side of school is full of opportunities. Ada has been at events most Fridays and has enjoyed lots of competitions from football to basketball. It's had a huge impact on her role in school. The children also get to perform at the Royal Albert Hall, it happens every two years and is in conjunction with other schools. The choir and band get to perform and parents go and watch. It's an incredible opportunity for everyone," said Tim.

Fantastic school spirit

"Ada is currently preparing for SATs. School have had a balanced approach to the tests and Ada is managing well and is taking it in her stride. I think having other things she enjoys doing at school helps and school are supporting the children prepare but are treating it as something that is just part of Year 6. Everyone is doing really well, there's no sense of unnecessary pressure. With the children splitting off to go to different Secondary School come the end of the year, the focus is making the most of the time they have left together, and to enjoy it. St Mary's has a fantastic spirit and I'd encourage parents to come and look around," said Grace.
