Encouragement and reward

We also enjoy the Holly Hill Heroes Assembly where the children are rewarded for particular achievements with a certificate in recognition of effort. Things such as this encourage the children and help to involve parents, which I really like."

Onwards and upwards

Due to unforeseen circumstances, Holly Hill suffered a fall in rating a few years ago but this was swiftly and effectively remedied making it, believes Joanne, an even better school than before. "We were actually very surprised by the result as we had not had cause to be particularly concerned about anything. Nevertheless, the school made a huge effort to address the issues and within a few months everything was not only back on track but actually improved. We saw this episode as a small glitch and are more than pleased how things have worked out so well."

Everything a parent could ask for

Everyone has their own ideas about what a school should offer and how it should be presented and, as well as her satisfaction with the quality of education, Joanne is impressed with many other aspects of Holly Hill. "The After-School Clubs are terrific, and both Abbie and Zak make the most of them. The emphasis on security is reassuring, and the premises are always clean, tidy and well-maintained. The Headteacher knows every child by name and all the staff are approachable and helpful, and to me that all adds up to an excellent package."

Joint effort

Joanne is a dedicated member of the school's PTA, helping its committee with fundraising events and other projects. "Because I believe so strongly in Holly Hill I want to do what I can to help," she says. "It does take quite a lot of time and effort but it is worth it to me for the benefits it brings in terms of extra funds and in raising the school's profile. Many of the staff also give up their own time to support the PTA and we work well as a team – there's no 'us and them' attitude, just parents and teachers wanting to support a great school."
