An easy decision

It was really nice to see him so actively involved this year."

Excellent after school club

As a working mum, Helen relies on the after school club for child care at the end of the school day. "I work shifts and living in a small community this kind of facility is really great," explains Helen. "It's safe, flexible and the children enjoy going. It works really well for us."

Strong community links

Not only do the children like the school, but the local people do too. "The support the school receives from the local community is really good. They get behind events and help to raise funds for the school. They seem eager to see it flourish. We're such a small area that the school is a key part of the community.

"We've had local people offering their skills to help maintain the school during the summer holidays, when funds have been low. We had a wall built with donated bricks and railings painted. It's not just mum's and dad's of children at the school, but other Tebay residents who are keen to see the school continue to thrive."

Active parental involvement

Helen has been an active member of the Parents' and Teachers' Association, Friends of Tebay since Edward first joined the school. "It's great to be able to get involved and try and give something back. We've raised funds which have enabled the school to have some additional computers and we're able to help fund transport for school trips. It's rewarding being able to help the school broaden the children's educational experiences."
