School day: settling in



The school day starts at 8.50am. The school day finishes at 3.10pm.

Extended school day

Our Toastie Breakfast Club opens at 7.45am and we offer a healthy breakfast of cereals, toast, yoghurts, fruit and a drink. We also provide a variety of play activities and have lots of fun.

Our After School Club 3:10 which is our owr after school club from 3.10-6.15pm. Details from the school office are available.

Uniform

We expect to see all children in a school uniform. Wearing a uniform helps children to feel part of the school and creates a pride in their appearance, their work and their school. Our school uniform consists of grey shorts/ trousers/skirts/pinafore dresses, pale blue polo shirts, royal blue school sweatshirts/cardigans, blue gingham dresses, black shoes and PE kit. We are happy to support every child to express themselves through their clothing; please talk to us if this rings bells!

School meals

Healthy, balanced school dinners are cooked on the premises. Children have a daily choice of three hot meals and access to a self-serve salad bar. Children make their choice at Register time. Any child with a food allergy always wears a white band to alert and remind our Cook and her team. Children are fully involved in serving themselves and putting lunch trays away. Children are encouraged to use knives and forks properly from their first day at school; MDS are always around to support.

Free school meals

All school lunches are free, so there is no money required at the school.

Break-time and drinks

All children are offered a piece of fruit to eat during the morning. Sweets, chocolates, crisps and biscuits are not permitted. Milk is available for free to all children until they are 5. Milk is then available at a small cost.



Rae and Duncan know the value of a creative approach to education, and at Cross Farm Infant School their children are getting that — and a great deal more

Rae and Duncan Wisbey live in Ash Vale with their three children. Hattie is seven, Otto five and baby Arabella is just a few months old.

An overwhelming impression

With a background and business in the performing arts, it is hardly surprising that Rae and Duncan wanted an education based not solely on academic achievement for their children. Having looked at the various options open to them, it was Cross Farm Infant School which appealed more than any other. "We visited several schools and I have nothing at all bad to say about them but it was Cross Farm that really stood out for us," says Rae. "The overwhelming factor was the ethos of inclusivity, the way that every single child was quite evidently treated as an individual and a feeling that this was absolutely the right environment for Hattie."

Flexible approach to learning

Whilst fully appreciating that some parents might prefer a more traditional approach to learning, Rae loves the way children at Cross Farm are given the chance to capitalise on their own particular talents, are supported in both their strengths and weaknesses and are fully encouraged to reach their potential, whatever it might be. "There is no 'one size fits all' mindset at Cross Farm, but the acknowledgement that

every child is unique and learns in different ways. As far as my own children are concerned, their teachers explained that whilst Otto responded brilliantly to the phonics approach to reading, having found phonics difficult, Hattie was perfectly capable of learning through other methods, and that has proved to be the case. That flexibility of attitude means that the literacy levels throughout the school are amazing."

Changing lives through empathy and understanding

This is something that Rae has seen at first hand as she is a frequent Reading Buddy at the school, as well as serving as a Parent Governor with a special interest in Special Educational Needs. The company she runs with her husband holds children's theatre workshops in schools in and around London and she has seen for herself how the lives of children with additional needs can be transformed. given the right treatment. "Cross Farm makes a huge effort to integrate and encourage SEN children and importantly, to promote empathy and awareness amongst the others. There is no stigma attached to any child who has behavioural issues and they are given so much care and support it is touching and impressive

to see. I know that it has changed some children's lives for the better, and it enables the others to understand, rather than judge."

Rae describes Cross Farm as like a family,

Family values

where everyone cares about each other, learn family and wider values and is welcomed as part of the school community. "Parents and families are equally as important as the children who are pupils, and the policy is one of involvement. There are so many opportunities to contribute to school life, through events such as Grandparent's Day, Mother's/Father's Day, Assemblies, performances, even a Samba Day during the Rio World Cup! There is an active culture of volunteering; Reading Buddies, Maths Mates and Pond Pals are involved in school on a daily basis! Home/ school communication is second to none, and as parents we are made to feel a vital part of our children's education. That means a great deal to me."

New ideas, new rewards

Despite having a great deal of experience in working with children, Rae admits to occasionally running out of ideas on how to support her own children's learning at home and thus has been grateful for the suggestions on how to do so in a fun and effective way.

"At first I was a little uncomfortable with the principle of Home Learning but actually, it opened my eyes to things I'd not thought of," she explains. "I am surprised by how much I have learned myself because of the ideas the school gave me and by how much that one-to-one time at home with your child can be such a rewarding thing to do."

The Yes factor

There is no doubt that Rae is a passionate supporter of Cross Farm Infant School, one which has given her children as well as their peers the confidence and self-belief they need to go on to a happy and successful life. "The wonderfully creative approach to teaching, the total dedication of the staff and the 'Yes, I can' attitude instilled in every child means that they have the tools and life-skills they need for the future. This school invests everything into making children the very best they can be. And Yes, they will is how it makes them feel!"

Compassion and commonsense

When the Head Teacher makes you cry it is usually because you have done something wrong and are anticipating some sort of punishment! As far as Cross Farm Infant School is concerned, this could not be further from the truth, as Jo can testify. "When we went to visit Cross Farm before Oli joined, I was so bowled over by the Head Teacher's enthusiasm and passion it moved me to tears. I knew straightaway that her outgoing nature, her compassionate approach and commonsense attitude would be absolutely right for my children, and nothing has changed since that time. The whole teaching and support staff network is the same - with a wonderfully nurturing and caring outlook that greatly benefits every child in the school."

Bringing lessons to life

Jo has no first-hand experience of other school settings, she instinctively felt that Cross Farm was the best one for Oli and, later, for Harry, too. "What I really love is the way that learning is made fun; the children are thoroughly engaged with their lessons because of how

they are presented in a thematic way so that English, Maths, Science, History and the rest are made to come alive. My children are learning because they enjoy learning, and that is what matters."

A caring environment

A key feature of Cross Farm is the emphasis put upon reading, and Jo feels this is a vital component of the school's success. "The Head Teacher told me: 'We learn to read at Infant School so we can read to learn at Junior School' and I couldn't agree more. What is more is that the children are taught in a way that makes them want to learn, and each one is supported according to their needs. The more able are encouraged to help those who need a bit of extra help and it's lovely to see them all looking out for each other. The caring ethos spreads throughout the whole school."

Expert support for Special Educational Needs

Jo has a special reason to appreciate the atmosphere of inclusivity demonstrated at Cross Farm as Oli was diagnosed as being on the autistic spectrum during Reception. Even though as a GP she is better placed

Inclusion: a curriculum for all



Special Educational Needs (SEN)

Cross Farm is a fully inclusive and supportive infant school and we believe that every child belongs to every adult, and every adult belongs to every child. We aim to give every pupil the opportunity to experience success in learning and to achieve as high a standard as possible.

Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator

All pupils receive a differentiated curriculum delivered through Quality First Teaching. Class teachers are responsible and accountable for the progress and development of the pupils in their class, including any pupils receiving additional support. Children who we feel are vulnerable to not achieving ARE (Age Related Expectations) are initially identified by class teachers and

where appropriate they might be assessed by the SENco (Special Educational Needs Coordinator); parents are always involved fully in this process.

Access

Our school is fully accessible to pupils with disabilities. It is a single storey building with

Gifted and talented children

We recognise that all children are individuals with their own specific needs, gifts and talents. Children who are identified as being exceptionally able or talented, are challenged to broaden and deepen their thinking and extend their knowledge and skills within lessons.

Facilities





Supporting the learning experience

We are fortunate to have some excellent facilities to benefit our children, supporting their learning and overall school experience. We have a woodland zone for our Forest School and our playground is large and zoned to accommodate a variety of sports and games. Children have access to a kitchen for cooking and Learn Pads, PC and Beebots for IT. We have a library and a school hall and a Studio for Drama, Music and clubs.

Outdoor learning

Our school has a wonderful wildlife area. Our youngest children have an environmental pond area, a garden, a campsite and climbing equipment, and our KS1 children have access to outdoor learning through their class doors.

Wide range

We offer a range of lunchtime and after school clubs for children to enjoy and we are always striving to introduce more to suit the requirements of our pupils. Recent clubs include:

Sport

We are committed to supporting all pupils to have access to a full Physical Education programme. We try to encourage all the children to "be physical" every day; ensuring fitness and well-being.

Happy and healthy

We strive to provide new and varied physical activities for children before, during and after the school day. We believe that PE and sport enhances academic learning and leads to healthier, happier and more productive lives. We have outdoor climbing equipment for children and provide after-school sports clubs, including Football club, Cheerleading club and Gymnastics club.

Music

We are passionate about music and performance and have specialist music and dance teachers. Our Year 2 children learn to play the ukulele and we have a Choir.



Rocksteady Music School

The Rocksteady Music School comes in once a week to run music sessions and give the children the chance to rehearse in a band together, perform songs they love and learn life skills along the way.

Ongoing assessments

Teachers make ongoing assessments of all children in order to help them better plan the next unit of work. A 'teacher assessment' at the end of KS1 in Reading; Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar; Writing; and Maths. Standardised Assessment Tasks (SATS) form part of the teacher's judgement.

Your child's achievements

Phonic Screening Check

The skills and knowledge of Year 1 children in phonics are assessed in the PAC (Phonics Assessment Check) in June every year. This is a national "test" that all children in England take part in.

School reports

Parent Consultation meetings are arranged for the Autumn and Spring terms when parents will be invited to discuss their child's progress

during an conference with their child's teacher. Year 2 pupils attend these conferences.

At the end of each full term (ie in December, March and July) parents receive a "developing" report which keeps them "in touch" throughout the year. This format means parents are never more that 6-8 weeks away from the next update (verbal or written). The July report in each of the year groups, is the final one of the academic year and it tells parents whether their child has exceeded, met or is working towards the age related expectations for their year group; GLD (Good Level of Development) for Reception and ARE for KS1 classes.

Discussing concerns

At other times of the academic year, teachers are usually available at the end of the school day to discuss concerns. It is also possible to make an appointment to speak to the teacher more fully at a mutually convenient time.
