School hours

School hours are 9.00am (with gates opening at 8.45am) – 3:00pm.

Breakfast club and after-school provision

Breakfast Club is run by school staff and runs from 8:00am — 8:50am. Gap Club runs after school until 6:30pm.

Uniform

Our school colours are mainly royal blue and grey. A full uniform list, including P.E. requirements, can be found on our website, together with details of how to order.

School meals and snacks

Free school meals

All children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 receive a free hot or cold meal. There is always a vegetarian option, available and the majority of special dietary requirements are catered for. Alternatively, children may bring in a healthy, balanced packed lunch.

Children in Squirrels and Acorns, and children choosing not to take the free school meal option, bring in a healthy, balanced packed lunch. We discourage high fat, sugar and salt items such as crisps, biscuits and chocolate bars, and we are strictly a NO NUTS school.

Drinks

Children under 5 are entitled to free milk, and it is also available to buy for older children.

Fruit and snacks

Nurseries and Reception have access to fruit, milk and water throughout the day. KS1 have free fruit and access to milk at breaktimes. They are encouraged to bring a named water bottle and drink throughout the day.

Warm welcome

Gina and Peter are delighted with the way staff and pupils at Engelfield Green Infant and Nurseries have welcomed Dexter. Gina says: 'We have just come over from Australia and this is Dexter's first UK school. We're incredibly impressed with it and have been pleasantly surprised by how quickly Dexter has settled in.'

Supportive staff

Dexter joined Year Two in September. 'He has caught up with the academic learning very well considering what his class are doing is quite advanced compared to the learning at his school in Australia. However Dexter seemed to pick it all up quickly which was a big relief to us. A lot of it is down to the support he has been given in the classroom by his teacher and the LSA – (Learning Support Assistant),' Gina says.

Making friends

Gina and Peter are pleased he has settled in socially as well as academically. 'He has been embraced by his classmates. They have reached out to him and made the effort to include him. He now has a very busy social life and has been invited to lots of play dates.'

Good choice

'Originally we wanted him to go to another school where he wouldn't have to leave at the end of Year Two but could carry on into the juniors without moving. But we could tell he was happy at school even in his first week and we were pleased how quickly he settled so we are glad now he was given a place at Englefield Green,' Gina says.

Happy and settled

'We were bound to be anxious about him because we had just moved to another country and he was only six years old at that point. Friends had told us we would notice a big difference in the education system when we came to England. They had said it could take Dexter several months to settle and that he might need extra support, but actually he is happier at school now than he was in Australia'.

Maths success

'He is good at Maths but has had to get used to an entirely different way of learning it. However, he has been praised because of how well he has adapted and this has to be down to the quality of teaching at Englefield Green.'

Parental involvement

'I am impressed with the way the Headteacher has involved parents in the new way of learning Maths. She put on two sessions for parents, one during the school day and one after school.

The Headteacher put in a lot of time in order to include us all in the learning process.'

Showing respect

'Dexter's learning has accelerated since he started at Engelfield Green Infant and Nurseries and he seems happy and confident. He says that everyone is nice to him. The staff are firm but fair.'

Curriculum: foundations for the future





The curriculum is divided into two stages:

- 1. Early Years Foundation Stage: from ages 0-5 years
- 2. Key Stage One: from ages 5-7 years

Early Years

Early years - Acorns, Squirrels and Reception teach through 'In the moment planning' approach, which enables the children to lead their learning, with skilled adults facilitating this development. The children learn inside and outside, with designated learning areas which are safe for our young children. Ofsted commented in January 2018 " In early years, there is a plethora of indoor and outdoor activities available for children to explore."

The Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum is based on the Government's Early Learning Goals with seven areas of learning:

Good support

Mary and Betsy are both happy and settled at Englefield Green Infant and Nurseries and Lois is grateful for all the care they have been given by the staff. She says: 'All the teachers have been wonderfully supportive and have done everything they can to help them.'

Making friends

Lois had no hesitation in choosing Englefield Green when it was time for Mary to start school. 'I actually went there myself when I was younger, so I knew it was a good school. When Mary joined the Reception class she had no problems settling in. She enjoyed going to school to see all her friends and liked drawing and doing creative activities.'

Enjoying reading

Lois says: 'Now Mary is in Year One she finds the learning has got a bit harder. She is not very keen on Maths but she loves reading and writing and always brings three or four books home in her book bag.'

Caring staff

Lois remembers how kind and supportive the school was to Mary after her Grandfather died. She was very upset at the time and afterwards she just wasn't herself and didn't want to talk about him. But the staff at the school really supported her. They helped her make a book about her grandfather and got her to open up about him. For a while she wouldn't talk about him at all but they really helped her come to terms with it.'

Great teachers

Mary Says the teachers are all really nice. Some of them were actually teaching there when I was a pupil at the school. The LSA (Learning Support Assistant) in Betsy's class was there and I remember she was always lovely.'

Winning trust

When Betsy started in the nursery at Englefield Green Infants and Nurseries she was less confident than Mary and Lois was worried about how she would get on.

'The teacher won her confidence and Betsy started to get on better. She used to take her stuffed toy to school with her for comfort, but after a while she started to talk to the other children and began to enjoy it more.'

Keen pupil

Now she is in Reception she loves school. She talks to everyone in the class and has one really good friend that she plays with. She loves school now and insists on going - even if she isn't very well.'

Writing skills

'She is getting on really well with the learning. She loves writing her letters. They both spend a lot of time at home writing and come to me and ask me how to spell certain words or how to write certain letters.

They love to show me what they have written and enjoy playing at being at school when they are at home,' Lois says.

Fun after school

'They used to do a cookery class after school but now they both love doing gymnastics after school. They really like the teacher who takes them for Gymnastics. I would definitely recommend the school to other families, as all the staff are so caring towards the children.'

Mary says: 'I love going to school and enjoy writing and playing with my friends in the playground.'

Betsy says: 'I like school and enjoy playing with the toys in the classroom.'

Equal opportunities

Safe, positive and productive learning environment

We believe that preventing inappropriate behaviour is more effective and beneficial to children than managing situations when they occur. Our aim is to create a safe, positive and productive learning environment, based on the principles of consistency, fairness, and engagement. In order to provide this, the school manages behaviour through positivity. To do this, adults and children:

• Work to ensure positive, professional and mutually respectful relationships are developed between staff, parent/carers and each child.

- Acknowledge and celebrate the talents, gifts and differences between individual
- Are always asked to do the best they can: Staff members will teach, facilitate and model this behaviour.
- Praise and reward appropriate behaviour.
- Use behaviour management strategies such as distraction, addressing inappropriate behaviour quietly, listening to what children have to say.

• Use restorative practices as a proactive measure, to de-escalate situations and to

Gum

Music

Music is an essential part of a child's education. It develops sensitivity, imagination and creativity and it provides a unique way of expressing feelings. Having something in common with the acquisition of language, music depends upon the ear and involves memorising, imitating and experimentation.

Rich variety of musical activities

All children, whatever their age, cultural background or ability are encouraged to take part in a variety of musical activities. In our

school all children are invited to take part in Harvest, Christmas and Easter celebrations and all other class and whole school presentations and concerts.

We offer piano, ukulele and guitar lessons for an additional fee, which take place once a week within the school day.

Golden Assembly

We celebrate achievements both within and outside of the school on a weekly basis. We encourage children to bring in medals, trophies and certificates they may have achieved as part of their out of school activities - such as dance or swimming.

Understanding teacher

Jaspreet and Amardeep are pleased their son, Esher, is now happier at school than ever before. Jaspreet says: 'This term he has really noticed a difference. He says his teacher is very approachable, she is in tune with his academic ability and she understands him. Esher feels he can go and speak to her at any time if he has queries.'

Aiming high

'His teacher has high standards for each child in her class. After the last parents evening my husband and I went home very happy and enthusiastic. Like us, Esher's teacher believes healthy competition is good for the children,' Jaspreet says.

Improved communication

'The teacher sets challenging homework but is looking for quality rather than quantity. She gives parents lots of information about what their child is learning to enable them to help their child at home.

We are kept informed by the school more than we were under the previous leadership and having better communications is a big help to me as a parent. Under the old leadership I had to make appointments after work to see what level Esher was at. Now the objectives set out for Esher are very clear. We are told what he needs to improve and what are his strengths and weaknesses.'

Home learning incentive

'The teacher gives us tips and ideas about how we could help Esher at home. He didn't particularly like writing but the teacher worked out that he is very competitive and suggested we set a timer at home to give him a specific time in which to complete a piece of writing. It worked like a charm. I am pleased that she understands what will spur him on.'

Interesting learning

Jaspreet and Amardeep are pleased Esher's class are doing interesting things to support their learning. Jaspreet says:

'They went on a walk to help them understand geographical locations and it also involved writing out their addresses, helping their writing skills. They are now doing cursive handwriting in Year One, whereas they used to do it in Year Two.'

Pupils are the priority

'I admire the way Miss McNamee puts the children's welfare first and makes it clear why she is doing something and sticks to what she thinks is right. Esher is happy with the new leadership of the school, which therefore makes me and my husband happy.'
