When Laura and Dan were looking for schools, they knew Outdoor lifestyle exactly what they wanted - and Mrs Bland's fit the bill. "When we saw some other schools, I found the heads were controlling

Laura and Dan are particularly keen on how the school values outdoor learning. Laura says, "Each class has its own outdoor area, and it does feel very much that they go where the children's learning wants to go, which helps build curiosity."

The school's topic approach has been fundamental in piquing Bradden's interest, "He gets really involved in topics, there are good cross-curricular links and lots of memorable experiences. For a music topic, they all played the steel drums and they had a visitor who created instruments out of recycled junk so that became their DT project - to make their own. Even in English, he was writing about John Lennon. It all feels linked and relevant," says Laura.

Giving back

Laura joined the PTA shortly after Bradden started school. She says. "I know how helpful PTAs can be in overcoming Government underfunding of schools, and I wanted to help. Last year we raised £10,000. We've put interactive whiteboards in every classroom, put in an outdoor learning shelter and a new library, new PE Equipment. It's been fun to meet new people,

Laura shares, "There's a real family feel at Mrs Bland's and they take the time to know each child and help them. It's very caring and supportive. Even though my daughter isn't at the preschool, they know her name and talk to her about starting next September, so she already feels part of the school community. School day: **settling in**

School hours

9.00am - 3.25pm

School gates open between 8.40am - 9.00am for drop off.

Acorns and Little Acorns, our nursery classes, have two sessions per day, from 8.45 am until 11.45 am then 12.30 pm until 3.30 pm.

Wraparound clubs

Breakfast club (for YR to Y2)

We run Breakfast Bees, our breakfast club, each morning between 7.30 am and 8.50 am. The cost is £4.50 per session, including a varied breakfast menu.

After-school club (for YR to Y2)

Bland's Bumblebees, our after-school club, runs daily between 3.25 pm and 6 pm. Experienced playworkers offer your child a variety of activities and a hot cooked meal. The cost is £11 per session.

Uniform

A school uniform gives children a sense of belonging and of taking a pride in their appearance. The children wear a navy blue skirt, pinafore, tailored shorts and trouser or a blue gingham dress depending on the season. A pale blue long-sleeved blouse, shirt or polo shirt and a royal blue cardigan, jumper or sweatshirt with the school logo completes the look for all.

School meals and snacks

Children have the choice of either a hot nutritious school dinner or bringing a healthy packed lunch into school. We are a nut-free school due to several serious nut allergies within the school. Catering firm Dolce has been providing our school dinners since September 2019. Children can order their lunch in

the classroom each morning, or you can do this for them using School Grid.

Free school meals

Every child in Foundation Stage and Key Stage 1 is entitled to a Free School Meal. Nursery children can also stay for lunch for £4.50 per day to cover both lunch and staffing.

Break-time and drinks

Children in Early Years and Key Stage 1 receive free daily fruit as a snack at morning break through the Government's Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Scheme. We encourage children to drink water throughout the day.

Mil

All children under five are entitled to a free portion of milk each day at break time. If you wish for your child to receive milk beyond their fifth birthday, contact the school office.

telling us that they didn't do any learning at school, they just had fun. We were saying 'well, did you learn this did you learn that?' and they said yes, but as far as they are concerned they are having fun!" says Aaron.

Worries eased

One worry that stood out in their minds was about the transition from infant to junior school. Now that eldest Izzy has moved on to Garland's they have first-hand experience of how well it can work. "We wondered that if by opting for an infant school it was going to be awkward when it comes to transitioning to junior school. In reality, it isn't a concern. The starting times are worked to enable sequential drop-offs and pickups and it all went smoothly."

Mindset shift

Aaron explains that Izzy has always been a keen learner with an innate desire for academic success, but that son Charlie would be more interested in playing computer games and sports. "During lockdown, he would be the first to want to turn off the zoom call and rush through his work so he could get onto something he'd rather do. The change in his attitude has been astounding. Whatever they're doing has ignited something in him; now he has that drive and he's asking to do his reading instead of the other way around."

Work-life balance

As many parents can relate, Jess and Aaron both have busy jobs and juggling family life is made so much easier by Mrs Bland's homework policy. "Another thing we love about Mrs Bland's is they don't have homework. Our friends have been stressed about having to get this done, but we don't have to stress. I have always felt, outside of a secondary environment, if you can't get all your work done in school hours you need to look at your hours. Mrs Bland's has done just that - they start a little earlier and finish a little later than other local schools but they get all their work done at school."

What the children say:

"I miss my teachers at Mrs Bland's, but I've moved with all my friends to Garlands, so we still have the same squad. Mrs Bland's was the best school with the best teachers and the school discos were amazing," reflects Izzy.

"I got star of the week because I stood up in front of the class to tell them about space, and I feel like everybody liked finding out about space too. I met my best friends at school and now they are coming for my first sleepover in January," says Charlie.





Inspiring and creative curriculum: foundations for success

Exciting and full of opportunities

We offer a rich and varied curriculum, and we aim to inspire in our children a love of all subjects including sport, music, visual art and dramatic art. We aim to be as creative as possible in our approach and we follow a topic approach to learning. These topics are designed to be exciting, relevant and full of opportunities to inspire the children to find out

Lessons for all styles of learning

We know that children learn in many different ways and when planning our lessons, we take into account different learning styles wherever possible to build children's confidence. In partnership with parents, we develop children's learning skills through following their interests and allowing children the freedom to investigate the world around them.

Literacy

We aim to encourage and develop a lifelong love of reading and books in all our young learners. Alongside teaching children to read with synthetic phonics, we encourage all children to enjoy books for pleasure. From reception, children have a fortnightly school library visit and continue to take home reading books to share with their parents alongside their Oxford Reading Tree Scheme book.

Outdoor learning

Our outdoor learning opportunities help develop self-esteem and confidence through hands-on learning experiences that allow children to make choices and evaluate risks. The ethos of outdoor learning is for children to take some control and responsibility for their own welfare.



Many children have fewer opportunities than ever before to run around outdoors, get wet, get muddy and be free. Our outdoor learning policy supports the full curriculum in an outdoors environment where children will learn from doing. We encourage children to work alone and in groups to problem solve, learn from mistakes and build independence and resilience as well as a respect for nature.

Mental health and wellbeing

We believe that mental health and wellbeing are very important. We want to equip the children with strategies to give them resilience during the

children in areas including emotions, self-esteem, anxiety, anger management, friendship and social skills, loss and bereavement. Our dedicated 'ELSA room' helps children to feel safe, secure and free referred through the class teacher or by parents.



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

Admissions arrangements

Nursery applications

We have a thriving nursery provision for Little Acorns (2-3-year-olds) and Acorns (3-4-year-olds). Nursery places can be funded in many different ways or combinations, including:

- Free entitlement to Early Learning and Childcare for 2-year-olds
- Universal 15 hours funding for 3 and 4-year-olds
- 30 hours funded childcare for 3 and 4-year-olds
- Self-funded for part or entire placement

All funding eligibility will be checked with the local authority before a place can be offered. Please visit our website where forms and guidance notes can be found on our nursery applications page.

Infant School Applications

All applications for a school place need to be made via the school admissions team at West Berkshire Council. Please visit www.westberks.gov.uk/primaryadmissions to learn more about the process and for an application form. We kindly request that you also complete an expression of interest form, so we have adequate details of your child in time for their start at Mrs Bland's. Transition to Garland Junior School

We maintain a very close relationship with Garland Junior School. With careful planning and consideration, we ensure the same natural transition from the Key Stage 1 curriculum to Key Stage 2 as you would find in any primary school where both key stages are catered for in a single setting.

During Year 2, activities are planned to promote this smooth transition to Year 3 at Garland Junior School. A timetable of dates and activities will be made available at the time. Applications for a place at Garland Junior School in Year 3 will become available in the Autumn term of Year 2. You must complete the application process to secure a place for your child.

Festina says all children are treated as individuals at Mrs Bland's -

Festina and Matthew are parents to Skye aged 13, Shae aged 11 and triplets Angel, Autumn and Ava aged four.

Festina and Matthew's boys both joined the Willink School when they started their secondary education. The Willink and Mrs Bland's share a site, so when it came time to start their girls at nursery, Festina and Matthew applied to Mrs Bland's. "They loved it so much that we actually moved from Reading to the Burghfield area to be closer," says Festina.

even triplets!

Settling in

The girls started in January this year, and had challenges that can be common with multiples who are born with ready-made playmates: They weren't really used to playing with other people. This had been compounded by growing up during a pandemic. "They are used to playing amongst themselves. Even at baby groups, they would always just stick together so it was alien for them to go into a room full of other children," explains Festina.

Understanding

The nursery staff really understood the importance for the girls to achieve independence and diversity in their play experiences. They were also sensitive about achieving balance through helping the girls explore who they are as individuals whilst maintaining their sense of identity as a unit of triplets. "The nursery allowed them to stay in their little bubble and would introduce them to other games and activities. Gradually they would take them off in little groups without the others to see how they interact with other children.

"They look the same but they have completely different personalities. The staff have noticed what traits they have. Angel loves singing and all the nursery rhymes. Ava loves storytime so she's the first one on the carpet. Autumn loves drawing. The nursery recognised their loves and interests and used them to help the triplets separate to build their independence and confidence." continues Festina.

Progress

At first, there were tears and reluctance to go to nursery but once the girls settled, they've never looked back. Festina says, "Now during half term, I get complaints about not going to nursery!"

In the beginning, when one was poorly they would call and ask me if I would collect one or all three. They get separation anxiety if one of them is missing, so we started off getting all three but the work the staff have put in now means we can just get the poorly one and the other two are fine."

Reaping the rewards at home

The nurturing environment at Mrs Bland's has helped the girls to learn so many skills that have been a godsend at home. Festina explains, "Things can be a little manic as you can imagine, but whereas dinner time was crazy at home now everybody sits down at the table and eats their food. They are used to sitting with other children all eating with knives and forks and that's made an impact at home.

"The nursery really focuses on building independence and now the girls can get their own coats and shoes on, and take them off, hang them up, put them away. I'm still running after the boys telling them to pick up after themselves but my four-year-olds can manage it."

A bright future at Mrs Bland's

Festina explains that she really wants the girls to continue on to Mrs Bland's Infant School in September once they are ready for school. "They are so nurturing. I didn't know anything of them beforehand but from what I've seen, they treat every child as an individual. It's easy for triplets to be lumped together as a unit but they do treat them individually and recognise their needs."
