School hours

Our school day starts at 8.50am and ends at 3.00pm. Lunch time is staggered, so the children eat and play at different times



Wraparound clubs

Free school meals

We are happy to say that all pupils can have a free school meal.

Break-time and drinks

Under the Fruit in School Scheme children are entitled to a piece of fruit each day.

Water is available throughout the day as children are encouraged to have a water bottle in class. Milk is provided free to pupils under five and those who are eligible to receive free school meals. Milk is available to other pupils through the Milk in Schools Scheme for a small charge.



Curriculum: "Children must be taught how to think, not what to think"



Broad and balanced

We provide a broad, balanced and creative curriculum. We encourage creative thinking and active learning opportunities and believe in the view of Margaret Mead:

"Children must be taught how to think, not what to think."

Early Years Foundation Stage

We believe that a child's experience of education in the early years can have a major impact on their attitude to learning. The development of skills and the ability to use

these ensure they achieve their full potential. Children starting school in the Reception or Foundation Stage will follow a curriculum called the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS). This curriculum is divided into seven areas that are equally important and depend on each other if children are to grow into well rounded young people who can deal with all the challenges that life throws at them.

Year I and 2

The transition of moving children into Year 1 is made as easy as possible. Initially the

environment and the curriculum mirrors that of the Foundation Stage. Planning continues to be through a topic based approach. Young children do not learn in discrete subject boxes. We do however ensure that all the areas of theNational Curriculum are taught and the children learn the appropriate skills and how to apply them. The National Curriculum includes English, Maths, Science, Information Technology (ICT), Geography, History, Physical Education (PE), Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE), Art, Music and Design Technology. We follow the Kent Scheme for Religious

Education which includes learning about and learning from religion. Topics are generally taught over a six week period unless the school or a year group has a particular focus. Parents are informed of these topics in a year group newsletter and are given suggestions about how to help at home. Information is also provided on the key areas of English and Maths that are being taught during the term.

Ongoing assessments

From the time your child starts school they will be assessed. This is through observations, conversations, how they complete tasks and how they respond to questions and information from their teacher. This assessment of learning is on-going, and is used to build a picture of your child, which is used to inform the teacher's planning and the child's next steps.

Targets

Your child's achievements

Children in Years 1 and 2 are given targets in reading, writing and mathematics throughout the year. These are shared with parents and carers.

School reports

Parents have formal consultations twice a year and are issued a written report once a year. There are opportunities to talk to teachers at other times throughout the school year.



Enriched curriculum: trips and visits



To further enhance and enrich the children's learning we take the children on various trips. These can vary depending on the topic the children are learning and can include local visits to places such as the library, park, beach, Bleak House and the shops. Some trips are further afield and have included:

Wild Wood, Wingham Wildlife Park, Build a Bear Workshop Canterbury, Natural History Museum London, Chatham Dockyard and the Dover Museum.

Visitor

Another way to enhance the curriculum and complement our topics is welcoming visitors, production companies and musical groups to school. Examples have been:

Special Educational Needs

Our school is committed to providing an inclusive curriculum to ensure that all pupils, whatever their needs or abilities, achieve their full potential. We will identify pupils with Special Educational Needs as early as possible. We ensure their needs are met, and that they make the best possible progress. We will also ensure that parents are kept well informed of the child's needs and provision by communicating regularly and effectively.

Mutual respect

We encourage 'mutual respect' within our school community, and believe that we should 'Treat others as we would like to be treated'.

Considerate

Everyone at St Mildred's is expected to be considerate, respectful and polite at all times. Children are taught about the school values and how to keep them through PSHE, Collective worship and Circle time.

"Pupils' personal development, behaviour and well-being are outstanding because of



School rules and rewards

Our school values encourage positive and considerate behaviours. Our reward systems celebrate and reinforce good behaviour and they include:

- All pupils start with a Green Card or on the Sunshine each day.
- Verbal praise (use of name, specific praise).

- Tangible rewards (stickers, certificates etc).
- 'Celebration' assemblies.
- Jedi of the week for pupils who keep the values
- Golden Tickets for celebrating good learning.

Pupils enjoy a wide variety of sporting activities through the curriculum and after school clubs

We use Sports premium funding to enhance Music curricular opportunities through being a member of the Thanet Schools Sport Passport. This enables children to participate in inter school competitions including gymnastics, Infant agility, athletics and KS 1 football. The children also participate in inter house challenges which include jumping, throwing, striking and balancing.

Music is taught in class and involves singing, playing percussion instruments, listening and appreciating live and recorded music. In addition Year 1 and 2 children have the opportunity to join the choir and learn to play either the recorder or ukulele.
