"Year 3 is going to be very interesting for both of us," says Nico's mum.






Another summer holiday task we give you is to draw a picture, do some writing or create a little poem about a favourite memory or something to do with autumn.

"I will soon be able to play my favourite songs," says Sam.





We also take you on lots of school trips to have fun as you learn about the place you visit. Some of our trips have been to:
