Inspiring values

Jo and James are very pleased with the way Ben and Alex have thrived in the supportive surroundings of Kingsmead School, where they are being guided by the good values of the school. Jo says: "The values give students a secure foundation for their future."

Building for the future

Jo likes the way students are given achievement points if they live up to the values, such as demonstrating Rigour with good work, and Courage by speaking up in class about any issues. She says: "It is good to give children rewards for living up to the school values as it will affect how they present themselves as adults and encourage them to work with and care about other people"

Impressive speech

After hearing good things about Kingsmead, Jo attended an open day when Ben was still in Year 5 at primary school. "I thought the Headteacher gave a very good talk to prospective parents and I was impressed with what I saw when I was going round the classrooms," she says.

Close friends

Ben's primary school was near Kingsmead and he went up with many of his friends. "His friendship circle has increased because he has got to know children who were at other primary schools and all his friends are now very close and support each other," Jo says.

Supportive teachers

When Ben started at Kingsmead, he hadn't been to school for several months because of the Covid pandemic. "The new year group were restricted to one building at the school to lower the chance of infection and there was some home learning. I think Kingsmead handled it well and the teachers went to a lot of trouble to support the children through the transition," Jo says.

Talent encouraged

"Once Ben was able to get into the routine, he began to enjoy school and he has had some very inspiring teachers. He particularly likes Art and was given extra time for the subject to develop his talent, but he chose to do Drama for GCSE rather than Art because he enjoys it so much."

Good role models

Ben has enjoyed Year 10 and being able to concentrate on subjects he has chosen for GCSE, such as Design and Technology, Geography and German, Jo says. "He has had some great theatre and residential trips with the school and last year enjoyed doing his bronze Duke of Edinburgh's Award. His teachers are excellent and always have time for the students, and I think it has been good

for him to have some good male teachers as role models."

Keen student

Jo says that Alex has had a great time in Year 7. "He also went up with a group of friends from primary school but was keen to start anyway because his brother was there. He has a lot more homework to do now, but is happy to get on with it and he takes responsibility for getting ready and going to school each day"

Ability encouraged

Alex takes lessons seriously but enjoys them at the same time, she says. "He is doing well academically and recently brought home a bronze certificate for taking part in a national Maths Challenge. He is good at Science and is given extra work to do by the teacher and he enjoys cookery and likes cooking at home. I have been so satisfied with Kingsmead that I have now become a parent trustee to help shape its future."

Ben says: "I really enjoyed Year 7 and we were encouraged with lots of achievement points. As I have gone up the school, I appreciate being treated in a more grown-up way."

Transition

Transition journey

Transition starts in the summer term with visits to primary schools to get to know students who are joining Kingsmead and answer any questions. Students from smaller settings will have the opportunity to attend meetings at Kingsmead.

We hold a Parent Information Evening in July with introductions from key staff, presentations from our students and the Headteacher and a chance to ask questions.

In July there will be a Taster Day where students will attend Kingsmead for a 'taste' of lessons. This includes engaging and fun tasks for students that help them to familiarise themselves with the school and our expectations. Students will also be involved in team-building activities that will support them in making friendships.

At Kingsmead we run a Stepping Stones programme to support students with transition, which involves a peer mentoring programme. Our mentors support the transition open evening and Taster Day.

During August we run a Summer School. Invitations will be sent to students who are identified by primary schools as benefiting from our Stepping Stones programme. However, if you would like your child to attend, please contact admissions.

Starting a day early

To help new students settle into their new environment, the new term for Year 7 will start a day earlier than for the rest of the school. This allows the students to familiarise themselves with the school site and spend time getting to know their Form Tutor and their peers. The first week of school introduces students to key staff, support available to them, the school's expectations, the library, and a transition project that supports them in becoming a Kingsmead student.

Stepping Stones

Some vulnerable children struggle with the journey from primary to secondary. For these children extra support is provided through the Stepping Stones programme, initially funded by the Greater London Authority. Support includes peer mentoring, workshops and interventions that are in place during transition and throughout Year 7. Students who have been involved in this programme have reported increased confidence and have had improved attendance, behaviour and attainment.

Role of the Form Tutor

Each student arriving at Kingsmead will be allocated a Form Tutor. The Form Tutor is both the student's and the parents' first point of contact at school. Students meet with their tutor on a daily basis in the middle of the school day for form time. This shared time with their Form Tutor is an important part of the day. Students will have a weekly assembly, complete a Character Curriculum lesson where they learn about the wider world and cover the RSE & SMCE curricula underpinned by the school's values. The tutorial programme includes Just Reading, which exposes our students to at least ten novels in an academic year, supporting the reading of our students. At Kingsmead our tutors stay with their forms throughout their Kingsmead experience, building strong relationships that are further developed during Drop Down Days. These relationships ensure tutors are able to identify any issues or problems and support the students in their forms.

We understand that it can be very daunting to start in a new school. We do our very best to settle in new students as quickly as possible.



Maxine lives in Enfield with her children, Grace, aged 18, and William, aged 14.

Help with transition

Maxine is delighted William can now stand up and speak in public and perform in concerts because of the support he has had from the staff at Kingsmead School. "William has come a long way since he joined the school in Year 7. The school were very supportive and their Stepping Stones transition programme helped him cope with his anxiety," she says.

Making friends

William had been prepared for moving up with a Taster Day at Kingsmead when he met his new teacher," Maxine says. "But he struggled when he first started at the school and realised he was in a much bigger environment than his primary school with a lot more people. Fortunately, the school were able to help him and he has now made some friends and is a lot less anxious."

Caring staff

Maxine's daughter, Grace, who is in Year 13, has just completed her A Levels and is planning to go to university to study Politics. "Overall, Grace's experiences at the school have been very positive. She suffered from anorexia, but the staff were caring and looked after her, and she has been successful at Kingsmead," she says.

Understanding teacher

"William has benefited from having a good Head of Year who has been brilliant with him. She knows and understands him well. I know if I email his Head of Year, I will always get a reply from her. Both my children have been well supported at Kingsmead. I would tell other parents they will get support if they let the teachers know they are worried about something. I can't thank Kingsmead enough for what they have done for my family."

Helpful mentor

William says after he started at Kingsmead, the staff made him aware of the opportunities available for pupils to get help. "If you are upset you know where you can go to talk to someone. The staff were kind and would listen to me. If I was anxious about something at home, I knew I could email a teacher and they would get back to me. I knew where to get help because of the Stepping Stones transition programme. I had a mentor who would give me advice if I was having problems with Maths, or some other homework."

Helping others

Now William is in Year 9 he has friends and is happy at school. "My favourite subject is History and I also enjoy cricket and football

I help to mentor the present Year 7 students and give them advice and reassure them they can always speak to a teacher if they are worried about something. In the mornings, we advise them that if they haven't had breakfast at home to go and get some hash browns or toast, before school starts. We tell them it is good to always have some

Enjoying singing

William now enjoys singing and performing in concerts. "One of my friends knew I was good at singing and encouraged me to perform. I will sing anything relevant to the theme of the concert. If it's an '80s themed concert I will sing '80s songs. My music teacher has been very encouraging. Singing built up my confidence and performing in concerts has paved the way for me to start speaking in public."

Speaking confidently

William now gives talks on behalf of the school. "I have spoken to an audience in central London and told them about the Stepping Stones programme and the help available for students going up to secondary school. I also speak at events, such as open evenings, and I have addressed the School Governors. I now have the confidence to speak to a room full of people."

Academic Curriculum

Knowledge-based, literacy-focused, pupil-centred

Our Academic Curriculum has three main characteristics; it is knowledge-based, literacy-focused and pupil-centred.

- 1. A knowledge-based curriculum: Our curriculum is designed to ensure that our pupils have access to the most powerful knowledge in a wide range of subject disciplines and develop the skills to use it. It is sequenced effectively to facilitate deep learning and it is structured to ensure that the powerful knowledge is secured over time, following the principles of cognitive science. Pupils are taught by subject specialist teachers who have deep knowledge of the disciplines they teach and who apply the most effective pedagogy.
- 2. A literacy-focused curriculum: Key to our pupils' success is being able to access and communicate effectively in a wide range of contexts. Teaching of literacy is disciplinary, and it is embedded, as well as explicit vocabulary instruction to help pupils access and use academic language. Fundamental to the Academic Curriculum is the development of our pupils' oracy, reading and writing skills.
- 3. A pupil-centred curriculum: Our curriculum promotes inclusivity and strives to be representative of the diverse ethnic, cultural and circumstantial backgrounds of our pupils so that they can identify with their learning experiences. It recognises that our pupils have different starting points and learning needs; it is adaptable, which allows for challenging and supporting our pupils to always achieve their very best.

Key Stage 3

The Academic Curriculum from Year 7 to Year 9 is built around the Ebacc subjects of English, Mathematics, Science, History, Geography, French and Spanish, plus RE and PE, and follows the full intent of the National Curriculum. In addition, all pupils in Key Stage 3 have lessons in Art, Drama, Music, Design and Technology (including Food and Textiles) and Computer Science.

Key Stage 4

Personalisation in Key Stage 4 is afforded by a three-pathway approach: Aspire, Core and Ebacc. The vast majority of students study the Ebacc Pathway. After a rigorous analysis of data and with the knowledge of every individual student, pupils are selected to follow the Aspire and the Core Pathways. These pathways will give students the best chance to be successful in pursuing a university course or a professional career.

Sixth Form

Sixth Form offers pupils the scope to select a programme of three or four A Levels from a broad range of 27 subjects, including 11 facilitating subjects. The curriculum extends to a rich menu of experiences which further prepare pupils for a university course or professional career. This includes a programme of careers guidance including assistance with preparing CVs, personal statements and applications, which supports progression to next steps. Visits to universities and participation in workshops encourage pupils to aim for courses most closely matching their career aspirations and aptitudes.





Amanda lives in Enfield with her children, Grace, aged 12, and her son, aged nine.

Taking part

Amanda has been delighted with the way Grace has flourished in Year 7 at Kingsmead School. "Grace is doing very well and participating in everything enthusiastically and I have been very pleased with how much progress she has made during her first year," Amanda says.

Supportive teachers

Grace's favourite subject is Maths and she has become passionate about the subject, her mum says. "Grace has enjoyed taking part in the Maths Challenge, competing against other schools, and was pleased to get through the first round and to hear she had been put through to the regional finals. Grace enjoys Maths because she has an analytical brain. She has a thirst for knowledge and the school are encouraging this. Her Science teacher told me Grace will often come up with questions which show her depth of knowledge."

Good impression

Kingsmead had not been in the running to begin with when Amanda was looking for a secondary school for Grace. However, the family live only a short walk from the school and so they went to view it. She says: "I was impressed by the standard of work on display and Grace loved it straight away. She said out of all the schools she had seen, it was the best, and she wanted to go there."

Enrichment opportunities

Amanda liked what the Headteacher said in his address to families and was pleased with the range of extra-curricular activities and after-school clubs on offer. "Grace was glad that students could have an input into the type of activities the school put on for students," she says.

Smooth transition

Only one other child from Grace's primary school went up to Kingsmead with her, but she quickly made new friends. Amanda says: "She was both excited and nervous about starting at Kingsmead and had been worried in advance about moving from one classroom to another for the different subjects, but she soon got used to it and settled well. The staff were very understanding because they were all new and Grace loves all her teachers."

Valuable experience

Grace has enjoyed working in a group with other students as part of the First Give project, which helps involve the children in charity work, Amanda says. "Her group picked a local charity, the North London Hospice, and Grace contacted them to find out what services they provide and ask them what they would do with the money the students raised. The class chose her group's project to put forward after they did a presentation to them and gave their views about it."

Student voice

Amanda says Grace likes the way students are listened to at Kingsmead and are given the chance to suggest things to improve the school. "With other students, Grace was able to meet one of the local MPs and discuss how the area around the school could be improved," she says.

Enjoying activities

Grace enjoys Music, learning the piano, and English and Drama at school, and likes playing for the school football team and going to the Science Club. Grace says: "I have enjoyed the trips we have been on during Year 7, such as going orienteering for Geography and visiting the oldest prison in London. I like going to the after-school clubs, particularly dungeons and dragons, because of the strategy and teamwork you need to employ to win missions."

Happy student

Amanda likes the way the school support students and how well the staff communicate with parents. She says: "Kingsmead is a very inclusive school. There are a lot of enrichment opportunities for students, and I can see Grace is very happy there."

Dana, who is 15, lives with her grandmother, Sandra, and her younger brother and sister, near Enfield.

Attentive teachers

Dana is very happy in Year 10 at Kingsmead School and feels her voice is being heard by the supportive staff, who have shown her they are prepared to take time to listen to her. She joined Kingsmead School after moving to live with her grandmother. "Dana had attended two previous secondary schools, where she had not been happy, at a time when her mother was unwell," her grandmother, Sandra, says.

After spending time out of school, Dana joined Kingsmead School in Year 9. "Since she started, she has been much happier. The staff have had a lot of time for her and she has known who to turn to for support," Sandra says. "The staff work with me to help her and we have had support from the Safeguarding and Wellbeing teams at the school. Dana's experiences at Kingsmead have been positive, whereas at the other schools she attended, nobody cared that she had been having a difficult time."

Understanding staff

Sandra says Dana would get into trouble at her previous schools for things such as colouring her hair, which was against the rules. "I wanted to pick her up in the afternoons from the other schools and

asked them to hold on to her until I arrived. but they didn't listen to me. At Kingsmead. the staff knew I had to pick up her younger brother and sister from school first and on to her until I picked her up.

Warm welcome

Things improved quickly for Dana after she started at Kingsmead. "The staff were very welcoming and did everything they could to give me the support I needed. At Kingsmead, they took the trouble to find out what was causing Dana's problems. The first improvement I noticed was that Dana was wearing her uniform correctly," Sandra says.

Learning responsibility

Dana has recently enjoyed doing work experience as a youth worker. "She was thought she wouldn't be able to cope with the journey, but she managed it. It helped her develop more personal responsibility. Dana's Head of Year told me they had received a phone call from the centre saying they were pleased with her," Sandra says.

Good listeners

"The difference with Kingsmead School was that the staff would listen to her and allow

a worrying time, it is great to see her happy and doing well at school now."

Kind teachers

Dana says she likes Kingsmead because "When seeing me in a negative mindset they always check on me instead of ignoring my wellbeing. There are teachers I know I can turn to during difficult moments. Happy environment

Laurel says Kingsmead is a great community to be part of. "I was nervous when I joined Year 7 because I didn't know anyone, but I was made to feel welcome. I would recommend Kingsmead to other families because the staff are very supportive to students and there is a school council so they listen to the opinions of pupils," he says.

Drumming lessons

"I enjoy music and after I was auditioned by the music department, I was chosen to learn the drums and I have now also learnt to play the piano by ear. I have enjoyed taking part in performances at school over the years and I am now studying for A Levels in Drama, Photography and Music Technology. I have had a very positive time at Kingsmead and I am now going to study sound engineering, either by doing an apprenticeship, or going to university."

Making friends

Mayumbu says Lauwina was also fine when she first started at Kingsmead and she made a lot of new friends. "She has also enjoyed doing performing arts and being in Joseph, and she particularly enjoys Art lessons."

Practical support

Lauwina says: "It seemed like a big school when I first started but everyone is very connected and it feels like being part of a big family. Everyone knows each other and there is a lot of help available when you first join the school. I really enjoy Art at school. It's a difficult subject but I like doing it. The Art teacher is very hands on and practical and doesn't just tell you what to do, but will show you, and I enjoy painting and sculpting."

Education for the future

Lauwina likes Citizenship lessons and thinks will help her in the future when she gets

the chance to vote. "We learn about politics and life in modern Britain. We have also learnt about the law and court system and organisations such as the United Nations. I have found it very interesting."

Good first year

Laurdy has enjoyed his time in Year 7 and has done very well. He says: "I like doing Drama, Maths and English and I enjoy sport, particularly basketball. I played basketball when I was in Years 5 and 6 and I was glad to be abl to carry on with it at secondary school and they have helped me get better at it."

Helpful teachers

Laurdy was worried about making new friends at Kingsmead because only a few children from his primary school were going there, but the teachers were a big help when he first started. "They encouraged all the new pupils to talk to each other and get to know each other during lessons," Laurdy says. "I have felt well supported during my first year. They explain how to do the homework, so you don't have to worry about it."

The Behaviour Curriculum

Behaviour is one of the three curricula, alongside the Academic Curriculum and Readiness Curriculum. We have high expectations for all our students as we understand that unless students comprehend how to behave impressively and appropriately, they will be disadvantaged, not just in school but also in life. Our expectations, practices and procedures aim to model and encourage the key values of our school. Staff members in the school reward our students for displaying our motto and school values throughout the day, which are:

- Practise to Perfect: students relentlessly putting in the effort to improve regardless of how difficult the task is.
- **Courage:** to take responsibility for our own behaviour and to push ourselves out of our comfort zone.
- Nurture: to respect and care for everybody in our school, be that in lessons or around the school at break, lunch time and lesson transitions. Everybody has the right to be respected and we work together to be kind and supportive.
- Collaboration: to work together to make sure
 we meet expectations in the belief that everybody
 has the right to an education. If we do not work
 together, valuable lesson time may be lost and
 progress will be affected.
- **Rigour:** to be the best that we can be. We respond maturely to advice and feedback from staff and strive to improve in all that we do.

Behaviour for Learning (BFL)

Our BFL team who work closely with students who persistently struggle to self-regulate their behaviour during both lessons and unstructured time. Students may also come to BFL for advice, support or mentoring from members of the team. The BFL team manage the school site supporting our students to transition calmy and enjoy their break and lunch times.

Mental wellbeing

Mental wellbeing is at the forefront of everything we do at Kingsmead. Students receive Mental Health education through our extensive Character Curriculum supported by assemblies and Drop Down Days. External services provide intensive support to students with varying needs ranging from universal services to CAMHS.

Inclusion and SEND

We provide effective support to students with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities, starting from our first contact with parents and carers when the students join our school.

We make sure that additional needs are identified early and offer a range of provision to meet the identified needs. To achieve this, we work with a wide range of professionals to make sure all young people receive the support they need to make progress at Kingsmead School.

Student voice

All students have a voice

We really value the input from our students to help make Kingsmead School and Sixth Form a place where everyone feels valued and has a say.

Student Council meetings

Our Year Councils meet regularly and feed into our half termly Student Council Meetings. They discuss the charity focus for that particular cohort, discuss concerns raised by their peers and celebrate successes which are then passed on to members of staff

Sharing with Senior Leaders

Our Head Students then share this information with the Senior Leaders who provide feedback/comments for them to communicate with the student body.

Students are involved in a range of activities

We want our students to be involved in all manner of activities. Examples include:

- The appointment of new staff.
- Introducing changes or new initiatives within the school, for example suggesting activities for our vast extra-curricular offer
- Contributing to the organisation of events such as Culture Day
- Helping to select books for our Just Reading programme
- Leading fundraising initiatives for their chosen charities
- Improving facilities within the school.



Pastoral provision

Supporting students

The aim of our pastoral provision is to support students to ensure they can succeed in their academic life and can make the most of the opportunities offered to them at Kingsmead.

We have a team of five Heads of Year who, together with their Deputy Head of Year, are available to support both students and parents. We also have a dedicated Behaviour for Learning team who are there to guide students into making the right choices and reflect on how they can learn from their mistakes.

Challenges

We are aware of the challenges that some of our students can face during their time in school and recognise that ensuring students are well supported in any mental health issues they might experience is paramount to their success, wellbeing and happiness.

Mental Health Lead

We provide extensive support to both students and adults through an organisation called mental health lead. The service provides a confidential space for students and, where appropriate, parents, with a skilled professional, where social, developmental and emotional problems can be addressed.

Stepping Stones

Kingsmead School is also part of the Stepping Stones programme. See page 4 for more information.

Medical room

The school also has a Medical room, which is permanently staffed by our school nurses who are first aid trained and undergo regular training. The school nurses will support students with minor ailments but also with any more complex conditions.



Pathways to the future: careers education

Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG)

In order to prepare our students for the various aspects of adult life, particularly the world of work, we provide a wide range of experiences and opportunities that are careers education and employability/transferable skills based.

- Work Experience preparation and placements.
- Enterprise Activities and other workshops designed to develop independence and transferrable skills.
- Opportunities to find out about the full range of educational opportunities available at each transition point, including technical education qualifications and apprenticeships.
- Impartial CEIAG delivered through interviews, both 1:1 and small group.
- Opportunities to hear from a range of employers and local providers about the opportunities they offer.
- Support in understanding how to make applications for the full range of academic and technical courses and other opportunities available (including apprenticeships).
- Online resources are used as an additional support to enhance exploration of careers and labour market information.
- Tutor time activities as part of the Character Curriculum and transition at all key stages.

Exploring higher education and apprenticeships

We work with a variety of higher education and apprenticeship providers. Over the past academic year, we have had the pleasure of working with universities such as Oxford University, Cambridge University, Middlesex University, University of Hertfordshire, Westminster University, Anglia Ruskin University and many more. We have also welcomed talks from ASK Apprenticeships and employers offering apprenticeships.

"This gave me experience of what I would be learning at uni and the chance to talk to students who were already there and helped me decide where I wanted to go after taking my A Levels."

Helpful advice

Ejaz says he did his own research, but was glad to have the staff to talk to about what he was planning. He was grateful they flagged up opportunities, such as careers fairs that students could attend. "In the Sixth Form at Kingsmead, there is always help available for students, even if you do your own research like I did. I found it helpful to have someone to discuss it with afterwards. Any student who needs help with applications will find there is good support from the staff," Ejaz says.
