It is with great pride that I welcome you to our truly wonderful school. We are a one form entry primary school, so there is a real family atmosphere, allowing all children to thrive. We believe that every child in our school should be treated as if they were our own.

Motto

Our motto, 'small enough to care, big enough to inspire-let your light shine', sums us up. While striving for excellence and inspiring pupils to become lifelong learners, we never lose track of the importance of dedicated care and expert guidance.

Gospel values

We are an outstanding Church of England Primary School (SIAMS 2013). Gospel Values underpin our whole school life, from how our highly experienced and devoted staff work with pupils and parents, to the teaching of the curriculum and development of school policies.

Broad curriculum

We offer a broad, balanced and rich curriculum where all children, of all abilities and faiths, are warmly welcomed. Our curriculum helps and supports all our pupils in achieving their personal best, in all aspects of school life.



School hours

8.50am – Doors open 8.55am – School starts 3.20pm to 3.30pm - Hometime

Wraparound care

Our Breakfast Club runs from 7.30am to 8.50am. A variety of cereals are available, plus toast with jam and a drink of juice or water. Our After School Club runs from 3.30pm to 5.30pm. Children are provided with a small snack and drink and can enjoy a number of indoor and outdoor games including craft activities.

Uniform

We believe that a simple uniform is helpful in establishing good standards of appearance in school and by wearing it the children quickly feel part of the community.

Children throughout the school wear a white polo shirt and dark green jumper/sweatshirt, grey skirt or trousers. You can buy school uniform items from wherever you wish, but please ensure everything is marked with your child's name.

School meals and snacks

Healthy, hot and tasty school meals are provided every day. Children in Reception, Year 1 and 2 receive a free school meal. The menu is available to view on the school website, and includes desserts, as well as a vegetarian option plus salad items, fruit, yoghurt, water, juice and low fat milk. Children are also welcome to bring in a healthy packed lunch, and we also offer the opportunity for these children to have school lunch on a Friday.

Break-time and drinks

Under the Fruit in School scheme infant children are entitled to a piece of fruit each day free of charge. This is given as a playtime snack. Water is always available during the day. Milk is available for all children up to the year in which they are seven (Year 2).

Those children who are entitled to free school meals will also be entitled to

Making the right moral choice meant

An ethical decision

Some things in life are just meant to be, believes Jason, and as far as he and Gabriella are concerned, their children were meant to go to St Aidan's Church of England Primary School. "We hadn't at first considered St Aidan's as it's further away from our home than the local schools," he says. "However, the other options meant that we would have had to declare ourselves as regular attendees of their associated churches and we were not prepared to lie about this. We heard through a friend that a place had unexpectedly become free at St Aidan's at the last minute, and now feel very fortunate that it was offered to Santiago, only days before the start of term."

A family event

Although not weekly churchgoers, Jason and Gabriella are Christians and for that reason are delighted that St Aidan's offers a Sunday School once a month, at which parents are also welcomed. "I often have to work on Sundays but I never miss the Sunday School if I can possibly help it," says Jason. "It is modern, absolutely child-focussed and great fun, and it's much more accessible than a normal church service might be for younger children. I was very keen on getting Santiago involved in playing rugby but as the club plays on Sunday mornings, there is no contest – he would much rather go and have fun at Sunday School!"

An inclusive and welcoming atmosphere

"The staff are all very approachable and maintain a playground presence so that you can always talk to someone if you need to. Everyone is so friendly, and even the older children are happy to mix with the younger ones which makes it feel very inclusive. There is a real community spirit about St Aidan's and

Gabriella and I have made friends there, too, just as much as our children have."

Lovely teachers + fun lessons = happy child

A child's enjoyment of school is often reflected in their academic performance and Jason has no concerns on that score: "Santiago is doing very well, probably because he loves being at school and enjoys lessons. It pleases me that he has had both male and female teachers, all of whom have been wonderful and with whom he gets on very well. Valentina has recently moved into the Reception Class from Nursery and she, too, adores school; she has extremely firm opinions for a little girl and we would be in no doubt at all if she wasn't happy there!"



Reward and praise

St Aidan's is a Church of England Primary School, and we encourage good behaviour and self-discipline in order to achieve a high quality of education for all children. We believe that staff and parents working together is the best way to achieve this. Our aim is to encourage good behaviour through rewards and praise, and sanctions are in place to discourage poor behaviour. Achievements outside school are also celebrated in class and in assembly.

School rules

The school rules are:

Behaviour code

- Move sensibly and quietly around the school.
- Always be polite and considerate.
- Treat everyone and everything with respect.
- Follow instructions from all adults first time and without question.

Safety code

- Never leave school without permission.
- Always ask permission before you leave the classroom.
- Always tuck your chair in and sit on it correctly.
- Be very sensible when entering cloakroom areas.

Playground code

- Obey and respect all adults.
- Show consideration to all children.
- Play safely at all times.
- Take care of playground equipment.
- Stand still and quiet when the whistle is blown.
- Always walk quietly into school.

Extended curriculum: trips and sport



Learning is fun: trips and visits

To extend the curriculum, and make learning even more fun, we offer many trips, residential visits and activities. Trips are organised in relation to the children's interests and learning. Y6 are offered the opportunity to participate in a residential trip which allows them to experience more extreme sports such as canoeing, rock climbing and sea cliff traversing.

Inspiring our pupils

We are always looking for ways to inspire children and bring lessons to life, whether it is by organising a visit from a Japanese linguist or by turning classrooms back a hundred years, dressing in costume and exploring life in Victorian or Roman times

Sport

As well as following the Physical Education programme of work as set out in the National Curriculum, there are many opportunities for your children to enjoy extracurricular sport and team games. Competition is at the forefront of our thinking and we take part in many local, LEA, regional and national tournaments.

We have received the Active Mark for commitment to PE and sport in school. We also enter a huge amount of competitions, and for the last few years have entered the most competitions compared to other primary schools in St Helens. We also have wonderful grounds which include:

A twist of fate

There can be few parents more passionate about their children's school than Allie Haggerty. But for a twist of fate she would have sent them elsewhere and thus missed out on what she believes is the very best possible early education a child can have. "I grew up in this area and had planned to send Jack to my old school, which gave me an excellent and happy education," she explains. "However, Jack's birthday is in September and only St Aidan's would take him at three, and I didn't want him to miss a whole year. So we decided to send him there for one year after which we would move him to my first choice but it only took a few weeks for us to change our minds. Once at St Aidan's, it's for the duration and nothing on Earth would now persuade me otherwise."

Strong moral values

The strong Christian ethic at St Aidan's mirrors Allie and Stuart's own values and as practising Christians, they greatly appreciate the way the school has those values at its heart. "St Aidan's is like a loving and supportive family, where children are not only impeccably educated but taught within a framework of morals which will last them a lifetime. The staff team is encouraging, nurturing and extremely caring, and places as much emphasis on kindness as on academic achievement. Both these qualities are rewarded and celebrated, with the result that the children at St Aidan's are caring, well-rounded and confident."

Mutual respect

Allie is closely involved with the Parent Teacher Association which is, she says, very well supported by parents and staff in equal measure. "Many people want to make a contribution because the school is so highly thought of," she says. "Everyone is prepared to give up their time to help where they can

because they feel so strongly about it. Teachers and support staff frequently work after hours voluntarily to run clubs and events because they genuinely care about the children, and this attitude flows through the school, where there is mutual respect between teachers and students. The children behave the same outside school as they do during the day, bringing home the manners that have been instilled in them."

Priceless qualities

"It would be impossible to put a price on what they offer the children. Nothing is too much trouble and everything they do seems to me to come from the heart. Whether it is appropriate academic support, pastoral care or personal guidance, it is given willingly, effectively and kindly, and it includes the whole family."

s Core values to nurture every child

Whilst Allie would not for a second denigrate other schools in the area, for her and her family St Aidan's offers everything they could want, expect or need. "So much of our children's lives is spent at school in the care of people we must trust with their welfare. Knowing that their moral and spiritual development is given just as much importance as their academic education means a great deal to me and St Aidan's is giving my children the compassion, care, acceptance and love I want for them. These are the core Gospel values we wish to pass on and I feel blessed that in this regard, as in others, we found the right school for our children."

Daily collective worship

A rewarding experience

During the subsequent years Fiona's good opinion of St Aidan's has only increased, and she is pleased to be able to make her own contribution in her role as a Foundation Governor because of her association with the church. "Part of my remit is to support the management and teaching staff and it is very rewarding to work closely with such a great team. Seeing how the school works from the inside has made me realise how dedicated every single member of staff is to the academic and personal welfare of the children, and I admire the huge effort everyone makes; effort which is not always apparent except from behind the scenes "

Early intervention

Small enough to care, big enough to inspire-let your light shine

Fiona has a particular reason to appreciate the professionalism of her children's teachers as, with a family history of dyslexia, she and Paul were aware that Isabel was showing signs of the condition. "St Aidan's arranged for Isabel to be screened and the early intervention has made a huge difference," she says. "With special measures put in place to support her, she has made wonderful progress in both her academic performance and in confidence. Before the diagnosis Isabel found school work frustrating and felt that she couldn't achieve what she wanted, struggling to keep up with reading and writing. But after the diagnosis she understood the reason why she had difficulties and the support has enabled Isabel to flourish.

Physical and emotional welfare

Counsellor, who is on hand for children who may be experiencing any personal difficulties such as coming to terms with a disability, family problems or bereavement. St Aidan's takes the physical and emotional welfare of the students just as seriously as their academic achievement, and as Fiona explains, the Kidsafe Programme is another example of this: "The Programme is delivered to each year group in a fun and age-appropriate way and is designed to help the children recognise personal boundaries. This may be in terms of any behaviour which makes someone feel uncomfortable, so they learn to respect one another and know that if they are worried about something, there is someone they can talk to in confidence."

"The Clubs cover so many areas of interest, whether the child is sporty, creative, musical or arty, and many of them are provided at little or no coSt Freya loves street dance and wants to join the 5 Note Band. I feel that these opportunities don't just provide exercise and entertainment, but they encourage teamwork, promote good relationships and address the fact that education is about much more than academic achievement. Admissions

Parents who are thinking of applying for a place at our nursery or school are invited to visit and look around at any time.

Nursery

We have an onsite Nursery provision which can accommodate 24 children. Children can start Nursery after their third birthday. Our Nursery is an integral part of our school and the children wear uniform, take part in worship and other school activities. Staff are highly skilled and have a lot of experience of working with Nursery aged children.

Sessions are from 8.45am to 11.45am and then 12.30 to 3.30pm. We also offer wrap around care between 11.45am and 12.30pm and Nursery children can also access Breakfast and After School Club.

School

Children start at Billinge St Aidan's in the autumn term of the academic year in which they will have their fifth birthday. A meeting for all parents of children starting school in September will be held in the summer term. This will offer parents the opportunity to meet the Reception teachers and obtain important information regarding the school's organisation

Governorship

Our school governors manage the school with the Headteacher. Our Governing Body is made up of Foundation Governors (elected by The Diocese), elected parents, members appointed by the Local Education Authority (LEA), co-opted governors, teacher representatives and the Headteacher who has the option of being a governor.
