First impressions

School hours

School hours are 8:50am-3:30pm. Breakfast Club open from 8am.

School meals and snacks

Hot meals are cooked on site. Our menu is nutritionally balanced giving children a substantial meal using quality ingredients. Mid-morning snacks are available for the younger children in Foundation Stage and Key Stage 1.

Various drinks are served each day including milk, fruit juice and water.

Children have a say!

Children have a key role in all aspects of school life. For example, children who are School Ambassadors join us on staff training days and whole school staff meetings, where their voice and opinion are valued and they are treated as equals.



Emma Posteraro lives in Darwen with her husband Mario, and five children – Dylan 12, Dale, 10, Demi, eight, Sonny six and Marcella three.

Changing classrooms

"Dale was in Year One at his old school and absolutely hated going every day," recalls Emma. "I didn't feel that he was getting the help that he needed and so when a friend told me what a good school Holy Trinity was I arranged for him to be transferred there."

"Holy Trinity is brilliant"

"Holy Trinity is brilliant and the staff are fantastic. Now Dale is so much happier every day and he absolutely loves going. When the children first started at the school they used a buddy system so that another child was able to help them find their way around and get to know the other children and that meant they settled in really quickly.

"My children go to a Breakfast Club at the school and at the end of the day they are brought home again in the school mini bus, which is great. I'm so pleased that we moved Dale to this school, and my other children absolutely love it too. I'm really happy."

"Helped him to come a long way in a short time."

The staff at Holy Trinity work hard to give the children the life skills they will need to deal with challenges they are likely to face in later life.

"The staff and the children at the school are all amazing," says Emma. "Dale has special educational needs and he has been provided with 25 hours a week of one-to-one support from a specialist assistant, and this has helped him to come a long way in a short time."

Recognising success

The school tries to ensure that all children at the school have a clear and distinct voice and are valued as equals. A special Achievements Assembly is an important weekly event that rewards the success of pupils.

"The children are given awards for good learning at a special Friday assembly each week," says Emma. "Sometimes when they get an award they are allowed to wear a different coloured jumper so that everyone can recognise the good learning they have done and they can feel proud. I think this is great because it encourages them to keep on trying to do well."

Returning to Holy Trinity C of E Primary School was the best thing in the world for Mick's adopted children

Mick and Karen Ashton live in Darwen with their five children, Joe 12, Greg, seven, twins Max and Leo, five and Olga, four.

Secure environment

When Mick and his wife Karen adopted five children they were determined to send them to a school that provided a happy and secure environment. Holy Trinity C of E Primary School was the perfect choice. "Joe used to go to Holy Trinity but after a family breakdown he moved several miles away," says Mick. "In the eight months he was away his grades went down and he was very unhappy but then he came to live with us and went back to Holy Trinity where he blossomed and did fantastically well. In Year Six he was awarded Pupil of the Year and we were incredibly proud."

Amazing staff

Mick attributes much of his son's success to the quality of teaching at Holy Trinity. "The staff are absolutely amazing," he says. "The teachers were so good with Joe and the headteacher is excellent.

"Our other son Greg now goes to the school and twins Max and Leo are in the reception class. I can't fault the school and all the kids are really happy. When they come out at the end of the day a lot of them go to give the teachers and the headmaster a hug. He's really good fun and has even been known to have a snowball fight with the kids, which they loved!"

Dealing with problems

If there are ever any problems at Holy Trinity the staff will intervene quickly and deal with these effectively and efficiently. "Max and Greg occasionally have behaviour issues, but when you discuss these with the teachers they are always very understanding and easy to talk to," says Mick. "You never feel as if you are wasting anyone's time, as they are always interested and clearly love the kids. None of the children worry about going to the teachers for help.

"Communication is excellent, and a newsletter is sent out each week so everyone knows what is happening, which is really good."

A good balance

"I'd recommend the school to anyone," he says. "The school's academic achievements are very good, but most importantly, the children are all happy and to me that means absolutely everything. The teachers seem to do a fantastic job in achieving a good balance between the children getting their work done, and allowing them to have fun."



Meeting individual needs

Holy Trinity School plays an important role in the lives of the Majid family. Dad, Nahid attended as a child, and so have all five of his children. The school's motto is: "No child is left behind" - something Nahid agrees with.

He says: "All children are valued and the school ensures their individual needs are met so nobody is ever left behind, which is very important."

Equal opportunities

Ali has Down's syndrome and Nahid is very happy with the school's inclusive approach to ensure he is happy and reaches his full potential.

"Ali absolutely loves school," explains Nahid. "He has speech and language difficulties and is unable to communicate verbally, Ali's one to one support teacher has enabled his class pupils and others to sign Makaton which has enabled other pupils to interact with Ali and welcome him with open arms".

Confidence building

The staff aim to make every child's school experience a rich and rewarding one where they develop confidence and pride in success.

"Mohammed was quite shy when he first started but now he is much more outgoing," says Nahid. "The teachers and classroom assistants really built up his confidence and he is very settled."

Welcomes all religions

Holy Trinity was recognized as delivering outstanding worship after a diocesan inspection in 2013, the school welcomes children of all religions and cultures.

"We are a Muslim family but Mohammed enjoys all lessons, assemblies and the choir," says Nahid. "It is good for him to learn about other religions and cultures and the school encourages this. There are many Muslim families at the school, which welcomes everyone."

"Both really happy"

Nahid says that both his sons enjoy their time at Holy Trinity. He explains: "I sometimes have to pick Ali up early for medical appointments during school time and if Mohammed sees me he gets upset because he thinks I've come to pick him up as well and he doesn't want to miss out on anything at school. They are both really happy there."

Changing perceptions

"When I was younger Holy Trinity School didn't have the best reputation and I thought things were still the same," explains Elaine. "I am the head of education for a national children's charity and I was really concerned, but I was persuaded to go in and meet Mr. Standen, who I was told was one of the best and most forward thinking headteachers you could ever meet. I soon found out that this was true."

Treated with respect

"I made an unannounced visit and Mr. Standen put everything to one side and spent two hours showing me around. He explained that all children are treated with respect and as individuals, and no child is ever held back or pushed forward for another. Education at Holy Trinity is an absolute partnership between the school and the parents. I was really impressed and decided to enrol Taryn. I'm so glad that I did."

Pride in the school

Holy Trinity School has excellent facilities and equipment, as well as a unique outdoor forest area, which is a source of great fun and pride. "The forest area is really great," says Elaine. "The school even has their own chickens and the children can enjoy being responsible for something. They care a great deal and you can tell that there is a lot of pride in the school from the children, the staff and the

Communication and leadership

The headteacher produces a weekly newsletter and has also developed a new mobile phone app, which is something that Elaine values. "The app and the weekly newsletters are very useful," she says. "Mr. Standen is an excellent leader and not afraid to share his vision for the future and making sure that everyone comes on board with it. "Discipline is great because you don't see a lot of it. If any of the children do get into trouble the staff spot it early and deal with it quickly and efficiently, but they treat the children like little grown ups, talking them through what has happened so that they understand."

First choice

"I've completely changed my perception and would recommend the school to anyone. A school that was my initial first choice recently informed that a place had become available but there is no way that I would move Taryn, as she is just so happy. When she leaves Holy Trinity School in Year Six I know she will be a better person, with good life skills that will be valuable to her in later life, and you cannot ask for more than that."
