We have to fill forms in and get permission to take the children out of school but the staff realise it isn't just for a holiday, it is our way of life, and they are always very understanding about it." Ambrose says.

"We had been living on the East Coast but we oved back to Doncaster to be near my wife's parents. y wife and her family are Catholic and wanted the ildren to attende a Catholic school.
