Emergency Contact Details

The Paracetamol consent form will enable us to provide Paracetamol when required. However, as a precaution we will not administer it until the child has been in school for four hours and when it is administered we will send a note home with your child.

The publicity form will allow your child to appear in publicity material, which may include press or television coverage for special events within the school. If you would prefer your child not to appear in photographs or on film, please ensure the office is aware.

Permission form

Frequently Asked Questions

Here are our answers, to what we find, are the most frequently asked questions. If you have any questions that are not answered here, please contact the school office and we will be happy to help!

Attendance and absence

We expect all children on roll to attend every day, when the school is in session, as long as they are fit and healthy enough to do so. At Rivermead we are committed to getting the best outcomes for pupils and for us to do that they must come to school regularly and on time. We do all we can to encourage the children to attend, and to put in place appropriate procedures. Unable to attend

Should a pupil not be able to attend school, parents are requested to contact the school by telephone on 01634 338348 before 9.00am. We will then record absence as authorised.

Holiday:

Parents are reminded of dates for school holidays and INSET days by letter, on the Rivermead School calendar, in newsletters and they can also be found on the school website. There is no entitlement for you to take your child on holiday during term time. Parents should only ever take family holidays during the school holidays. At Rivermead School family holidays in term-time are actively discouraged and families can be fined for taking such family holidays without the permission of the Headteacher.

Reluctant to come to school

If for any reason your child is reluctant to come to school, please contact us immediately to discuss your concerns. Your child could be avoiding school for a number of reasons at home or school and it is important that we identify the reason and work together to tackle the problem.

Request for absence

We do understand that there are circumstances where a parent may wish to request leave of absence for a child to attend, for example, a significant event. Consideration will be given but leave is usually only granted in exceptional circumstances. Parents and carers who wish to request annual leave for 'exceptional circumstances' should apply in advance in writing to the Headteacher. It should be noted that from September 2013 regulations allow local authorities to impose penalty fines for parents and carers who take their child out of school during term time in unauthorized circumstances.

Medical appointments

Please try to make routine medical appointments after school or during the holidays; if this is not possible and your child misses school for a medical appointment you must provide the school with evidence of the appointment - a copy of a hospital letter/appointment card etc. It is expected that parents and carers will make every effort to return the child to school after the appointment unless you have discussed the reasons why this is not possible with a senior member of staff before the appointment.

Curriculum

A committed teaching staff with a range of specialisms delivers a rich and challenging curriculum differentiated to meet the needs of each learner. Learners are encouraged to achieve their full potential academically and all achieve success in GCSE and other public examinations in Year 11. A strong emphasis on personal growth and developing independence is promoted throughout the school both in the curriculum and through the wide variety of enrichment and extra-curricular opportunities on offer

Years 7 to 11 (11 -16 years) are based at our Forge Lane site in Gillingham, Kent where the school has a range of fully equipped specialist classrooms with up to date technology as well as social spaces and therapy areas.

Post-16 provision is based at MidKent College, Gillingham where we have our own base and access to all that the college has to offer.

Skills and knowledge

Our curriculum is based on the National Curriculum and challenges and extends our learners, enabling them to develop both their personal and their academic skills and knowledge. Our investment in excellent resources and staff development has supported our continuing development and ensured that our curriculum is of the highest quality.

Our learners often achieve successes that neither they nor their families would ever have thought possible. Their outcomes show huge progress from their starting points and we are proud of their achievements. By the end of Key Stage 4 students have achieved success from entry level to GCSE's in a range of subjects from A-G or 9-1. All of our learners achieve public examinations as well as developing personal and practical skills to prepare them for independence, adult life and the world of work.

Monitoring the progress of all children is an ongoing process which enables prompt identification of any child who may require additional or different provision to be made. We work closely with parents and value their contribution to their children's education.

Skills for Life

All of the work that we do is to achieve our core purpose. That is to see our young people develop into independent adults who are able to achieve success in their chosen field and can lead a purposeful and enjoyable life. Developing the skills for independent adult life is, therefore, an essential element of our work throughout the school. Handling money, independent travel, being able to eat confidently in a social context and knowing where to find help for a range of everyday problems are among the many skills that we teach both in the classroom, in enrichment activities and during leisure time.

We provide a rich variety of experience and opportunities to develop these skills in the real world through visits out of school, visitors to the school and our links with other organisations such as MidKent College.

College courses

Our partnership with MidKent College enables all of our Year 10 and 11 learners to have access to a day each week in college following a vocational course, preparing them for transition post-16. This provides an invaluable opportunity not only to develop a range of vocational skills that can be applied to a variety of workplaces, but also provides a context in which our learners can develop their independence and practice the life-skills they are developing. College based learning is an

invaluable preparation for transition to post-16 education.

Work experience

All Year 10 learners undertake two weeks of work experience. This is an exciting and enjoyable challenge for all our young people. It is another invaluable 'real life' opportunity to put into practice skills learned at school.

GCSE

Another option open to our year 10 and 11 learners is to take on the study of further GCSE's in either RE or History through an outside facilitator who takes charge of the course and assessment with an in school facilitator who helps the learners on an individual basis in their weekly lessons.

SEAL

Every school day begins with a SEAL (Social and Emotional Aspects of Learning) lesson when form groups explore topics that prepare them for becoming confident and effective members of the community. SEAL is intended to help promote development and use of social and emotional skills towards learner's education, using five areas (proposed in Goleman's (1995) model of emotional intelligence):

- Self-awareness
- Self-regulation (managing feelings)
- Motivation
- Empathy
- Social skills

Intervention and therapies

Rivermead provides outreach to children, in full-time education, aged 4 - 16 years who are currently unable to access school because of their medical needs. Provision includes home learning for those who are too ill to attend outside of home, bedside education for those whose stay in Medway Maritime Hospital in excess of five days, and a reintegration unit (6+6) for those who, due to their emotional needs, require support to return to school. This provision is currently for 11 - 16 year olds only. We also provide advice to schools about how to support pupils with medical needs.

Referrals to any of these provisions are from the child's current school. Referral forms are available from the school office. All referrals must be supported by medical evidence.

6+6 Unit

The 6+6 Unit is an outreach service provided for learners who have psychiatric needs supported by Tier 3 Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (Canada House or Gatland House). We provide a safe, productive and supported learning environment to enable learners to re-engage with their education. Reintegration is supportive and proactive for the learner, parent/carer and home school. The initial period is up to 6 weeks in our unit and following this there will be an assessment followed by a further 6 weeks of increasing periods of reintegration. Our approach though is flexible and responsive to the individual's and home school's needs.

Home Tuition

At Rivermead we also provide home tuition for those unable to attend school. For more information about eligibility, please contact the Rivermead school office.

Speech and Language Therapist

The Speech and Language Therapist works with individual learners, small groups and school staff to ensure that our learners reach their communication potential. The Speech and Language Therapist works in collaboration with the National Health Service Speech and Language Therapy Team, through termly meetings, making referrals where appropriate and joint running of intervention. As a school we value joint working and the provision in school is not designed to run in isolation from the NHS Service. If your child receives therapy, they may have involvement from both therapists who will jointly plan the intervention.

Intervention

The Speech and Language Therapist in school also aims to work jointly with SEAL Tutors, class teachers, teaching assistants and other professionals e.g. Educational Psychologist, Occupational Therapist. Intervention includes team-working, 1:1 Therapy, group intervention in class, group intervention outside the classroom and termly check-ins.

Parents will be kept informed of any progress and decisions through a review report for learners receiving individual therapy. The on-site SALT will also be available at parent evenings and Annual Review meetings when required. We also welcome parents making contact at any time. Due to a high proportion of our learners having statemented needs for SLCN, the Speech and Language Therapist in school works on a consultancy basis, where teachers and SEAL Form Tutors are free to liaise for advice at any point.

Accessing support

Intervention usually lasts for two terms and is then reviewed. If the learner has made good progress they will have a therapy break and their needs will be reviewed at the beginning of the next new term. If SLCN is having a significant impact on the learner's daily life and progress in school, therapy will continue on a termly basis. Each Learner receives a screen for SLCN upon entry to the school and SEAL Form Tutors are also free to make a school based referral where needed. If parents would like their child to access support they should liaise with their SEAL Form Tutor.

Jewellery and other valuables

Jewellery, including rings and necklaces should not be worn as nasty accidents can occur. If your child has pierced ears, only small studs should be worn in the interests of safety. It must be noted that for health and safety reasons, earrings must not be worn during PE lessons and we request that your child does not wear earrings to school on PE days. Wrist watches may be worn to school but we cannot accept responsibility for their safekeeping.

Sport

PE at Rivermead is known as Staying Healthy. Mr Nolan is our Head of Staying Healthy and is supported by the Sports TAs. All learners have two 45 minute lessons a week of Staying Healthy. Learners participate in a wide range of activities designed to suit every individuals' needs. We look to develop and refine learners' skills and knowledge of sport by following a traditional programme, including football, hockey, dance, basketball, swimming, table tennis and trampolining. We frequently make use of local amenities to provide a varied program.

Frequently Asked Questions

Clubs

At Rivermead, we have a number of extra-curricular opportunities available before and after school and at lunchtimes. Through trained professionals, Rivermead also offers optional music lessons to learners during the school day including the violin and the guitar. Club options include:

- Gym club.
- Choir.
- Library Club.
- ICT Club.
- Gardening Club.
- Art Club.
- War Gaming Club.
- Sonic Club.
- Rock Climbing.
- Dragons.Basketball
- Football.Dance.

School trips

Visits vary and cover the full spectrum of the curriculum. Examples include:

- The Houses of Parliament where learners had the opportunity to enjoy a guided tour, a workshop in the education centre and a question and answer session with their local MP.
- A series of art trips to Maidstone Museum and the Turner Contemporary in Margate.
- A Mud Run to raise money for Help For Heroes.
- Learners have had the opportunity to go to Tate Britain and the British Museum.

The older students have enjoyed time learning to drive at Young Drivers and every week have been progressively becoming more independent as travellers and now stop at a restaurant on the way back to school for lunch.

Music

Learners broaden their knowledge of the different components of music (performing, composing and listening) through engaging and interesting activities. They learn about the orchestra, the genres of music, different artists and the recording process. As well as this, they develop a better understanding of the key elements within a song such as dynamics, tempo and pitch and they learn how to analyse and manipulate this within their own compositions and appraisals. Learners at Rivermead also have the opportunity to learn how to play guitar or violin in short music lessons held on-site by highly-experienced instrumental tutors.

Destination of school leavers

The Rivermead/Mid Kent College Partnership Provision is run for 16-19 year old learners with Special Educational/Additional Needs as outlined in their Education Health and Care Plans. While Rivermead School is primarily a specialist provider for learners with Autistic Spectrum Disorder, the Sixth Form also supports a variety of other complex needs and multiple diagnoses.

Rivermead staff from school support at the college within a base room where learners access a 5-day-a-week wraparound service to ensure that the 'every child can achieve' ethos from the School is embedded into the joint Sixth Form. Individualised timetables are created and reviewed for each learner transitioning from School to College.

The Rivermead/Mid Kent College Partnership has 100% progression and retention rates for learners who either progress onto other college course, apprenticeships or employment.

Emergency arrangements

We will always endeavour to open the school, but in cases of severe bad weather that may affect access to our essential services, closure may be unavoidable. During severe weather information will be provided via the parent text messaging service and on our website (www.rivermead.org.uk). It is the usual practice that a central decision is made on the closure of special schools and all schools may be closed at the same time.

Collecting your child

If school closure is announced during the day due to severe weather conditions, and your child does not access local authority transport provision, every effort must be taken to collect your child as soon as possible. If you personally cannot get to school, or you work out of the local area, please have a contingency plan; i.e. please nominate an adult to collect your child in your absence and organise this beforehand as the weather forecast is likely to have alerted us to the possibility of hazardous weather conditions during the day. Please make sure that we have at least two current contact numbers, in case we need to contact you urgently. Where children use local authority transport, the school will liaise with the local authority for home transport in the event of an emergency school closure.

Health and welfare

The prime responsibility for a learner's health lies with the parent or carer who is responsible for the learner's medication and should supply the school with any relevant information. Teachers and support staff are in loco-parentis and may need to take swift action in an emergency, both in school and off-site, for example during school trips.

Informing the school

Parents/Carers are responsible for informing the school of any medical condition affecting their child. Those with parental responsibility will be asked to include this information on the school's admission form. Thereafter, parents/carers will need to inform the School Office of any changes or new information. In addition parents are invited, on a regular basis, to check their child's information and amend records as appropriate.

Medicines and drugs

Learners must hand all medicines to a member of staff immediately on entering the school. Controlled drugs must be kept in the locked medicines trolley in their original containers and only the named staff are to have access. A record must be kept for Audit and Safety purposes. Keys to access medicines are held in a locked key cabinet located in the School office.

Prescription Medicines

No learner under the age of 16 is to be given medicines without prior written consent from the person(s) who has parental responsibility for the child.

Medicines must be provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include the prescriber's instructions for administration.

Sickness

Children who are absent from school because of vomiting and/ or diarrhoea must be kept at home for 48 hours following the sickness.

III at school

If your child is ill whilst at school, or involved in an accident, we will attempt to contact you immediately and we will appreciate your support on these occasions. Please make sure that contact numbers are kept up to date.

Working with parents

Parental involvement

We work in close partnership with families and our staff develop strong relationships with parents. We welcome parents into school. We establish good communication with parents which is individualised to their needs. Parents can make appointments with teachers if they have any concerns. This will normally take place with the learner's SEAL tutor.

Assessment

We use a wide range of assessment tools so that we can be clear about pupils' progress. All children's progress is measured using the National Curriculum Levels and a range of other assessment tools dependant on the needs of the individuals and this is discussed regularly with parents. Parents are encouraged to be part of their children's learning programme, helping them set individual goals or targets alongside those that may be set by their targets and reviews.

Pupil Involvement

We are aiming to involve all pupils, wherever it is appropriate and possible, in the assessment process. Pupils should provide their views for Annual Reviews as far as possible.

Reporting to parents

End of year reports detailing Academic achievements/progress throughout the year are sent home in July.

Parent evenings

We have one parents' evening per year group and an annual review meeting for the statement or EHCP. We also have more informal meetings where parents are welcome to attend and discuss progress. We have a Parent Council that all parents are free to join. We also have celebration assemblies which celebrate the success of our learners.

Communication

We understand how important effective communication is in terms of our communication with families and professionals and the approach we use in school with all of our pupils. You can communicate with school in person, by phone and by email.

New:

You can find our regular newsletters on the school website under our 'Info Zone' category and the 'Newsletter' sub-category. Our website also has a 'Calendar' section which acts as a reminder for important dates and events.

The Home School Agreement

We believe it is essential to have strong links between home, school and the community. All children, parents and teachers are asked to sign a Home School Agreement that outlines the intentions of all three parties. A copy of which is returned home to the parents.
